## Prezidentův komentář/President's Notes By Judy Aubrecht

Pozdrav bratři a sestry / Greetings Brothers and Sisters

Several years ago, the Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota's Board of Trustees identified the rear fire escape at the C.S.P.S. Hall as a severe problem and prioritized it as an important project. However, efforts and fundraising had already been directed toward the air conditioning project, as well as for the Hall's fire suppression system. In early April last year, the rear fire escape, dated 1919, failed an inspection by the City of Saint Paul. This occurred just days before the visit of Czech dignitaries, including the prime minister. A rented fire escape was temporarily installed to maintain the large group certificate of occupancy, with the hope that a new fire escape would soon replace it.

After extensive planning and consultation, the replacement fire escape design was recently selected and approved. L.I.W., Inc., of Ramsey, Minnesota, was selected to fabricate and install the new stairs. The City of Saint Paul issued a construction permit for the installation of the new fire escape in March.

Several additional items were resolved during the design process. A structural engineer analyzed and identified where the stairs needed to attach to the building and also determined where proper supports needed to be installed. The preferred stair treads were on back order, and a different tread was selected and approved. A separate permit was required for constructing a shed over the basement steps, which is also used by our new restaurant tenant, Pajarito. Selected to clear the site, Pelco Construction of White Bear Lake will pour the concrete footings and re-build the shed over the basement steps.

Locating and coordinating the workers and determining the installation schedule also took considerable effort. Throughout the design and scheduling process, Ed Hamernik, our Sokol Minnesota second vice president, and John Yust, the architect who designed our elevator and the new fire escape, have worked hard to coordinate this project.

Project funding is progressing with generous and much appreciated donations by Sokol members, friends, and Sokol Minnesota Charitable Gaming operations. Two American Sokol grants, both coordinated by Joyce Tesarek, Sokol Minnesota Finance Chair, helped our funding cause.

The Board of Trustees has prioritized major additional building projects for 2017. The next repair project will be to repair or replace the parapets on the roof of the building and additional tuck-pointing of the building walls. Cracked parapets allow water to seep into the walls of the building, which can cause major damage. The tuck-pointing will replace damaged or worn out mortar and bricks. Bids have been obtained. A large matching grant for this work was applied for through the City of Saint Paul. This matching grant will require significant fundraising to match the potential grant. We appreciate your continued generosity to maintain our beloved C.S.P.S. Sokol Hall. *Nazdar!*

## Highlights from the Board of Directors Meeting By Denise Stibal, Recording Secretary

The Sokol Minnesota Board of Directors met on March 16. Prior to the meeting, Joan Sedlacek approached the board with a proposal to borrow artifacts to bring to the Cedar Rapids *slet*. She will send pictures to the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library, and if they express interest, she will deliver them in time for the event.

Joyce Tesarek presented the Finance Committee report for year-end 2016. The committee will review the budget for 2017 at the next meeting.

Ed Hamernik from the Building Committee reported that the new stairs will be installed before April 30. Painting inside the Hall is scheduled for August 2017.

Jean Draheim reported that we had 77 people in attendance for the performance by Patrick Dewane of "The Accidental Hero" on March 3. Patrick has agreed to return in 2018 for a fundraising performance.

Our next building project is to repair the parapet caps and tuck pointing the bricks as needed. We have received a bid for this work of \$237,448. Two American Sokol grants, both coordinated by Joyce Tesarek, Sokol Minnesota Finance Chair, helped our funding cause.

## **Czech Passport Renewals Made Easier**

Czech citizens now may opt to collect their new biometric passports at an Honorary Consulate, according to Marit Lee Kucera, Honorary Consulate of the Czech Republic in Minneapolis. This means only one trip to Chicago (New York, Los Angeles, or Washington) to renew a Czech passport.

Application for the new biometic passport of the Czech Republic must be submitted in person at the Embassy (Washington, D.C.) or at a Consulate General of the Czech Republic (Chicago, New York City, or Los Angeles); not at an Honorary Consulate. Physical personal appearance is necessary to collect the fingerprints.

At the time of submitting the application, the person is required to choose the office where the issued passport will be collected. The passport can be collected in person at

- 1) a municipal authority in the Czech Republic,
- 2) an Embassy or Consulate General of the Czech Republic, or 3) an Honorary Consulate in the United States authorized to handle biometric passports by the supervising post.

If the applicant chooses to collect the new passport at an Honorary Consulate, he/she must provide, at the time of application, two USPS Priority Mail Express Flat Rate Envelopes prepaid for \$22.95 each.

## Keeping a Heritage Language Alive in Minnesota: The Case of the Czech & Slovak School Twin Cities

"Tenemos las mejores enchiladas. Ven a visitarnos. Todo para la comunidad."\* What used to be Czech announcements in shop windows are now advertisements in Spanish. Where Czechs lived for most of the twentieth century are now well-established communities from Central America. It was March, time for spring break, but Renáta Tichá, President of the Czech and Slovak Cultural Center, and I were not strolling down Cancún beaches. We were wrapped in our coats, gloves, and scarves, and squinting into the sunshine in Cicero, Illinois. Despite the Latino storefront signs, our long weekend was filled with Czech language, culture, and food.

Czech and Slovak organizations exist everywhere, and it is always mutually beneficial to exchange anecdotes and ideas for teaching the two heritage languages to our children. Throughout the years of the existence of our Czech & Slovak School Twin Cities, we have developed close bonds with teachers in Texas, North Carolina, and California. However, we primarily know the teachers in Chicago, and it was time to pay a visit to their T. G. Masaryk Czech School. It houses classrooms, guest rooms, and even a garden while serving 30 students from the community.

Renáta and I represent a group of devoted teachers who come to the C.S.P.S. Hall each week to teach Czech and Slovak as native and non-native languages. With close ties to our home countries and with the support of academic research results, we focus on teaching our heritage languages in order to prepare our students for the Seal of Biliteracy that will prove multiple-language proficiency and multicultural knowledge.

On that Saturday, from the school near Cermak Street, we took the 'L' train to downtown Chicago. We spent the afternoon with Czech Consul

He encouraged us to stay in touch with the consulate and with other representatives of the Czech government as well. We look forward to Dr. Lizec's next visit to Saint Paul.

That evening we accepted an invitation to see a Czech movie and to meet one of the lead actresses. We felt proud of our own successful efforts to present Czech and Slovak movies to the Twin Cities audience, through the Minneapolis Saint Paul International Film Festival in April and *Czech that Film!* in August. Exposure to new Czech and Slovak movies not only helps our community keep up with ever-changing languages, but also reconnects us to current societal issues in both countries.

The next morning found us back on the 'L' train, and feeling like mass transportation pros as we wished for more light rail lines back home in the Twin Cities. Our stop was the historic Palmer House with its frescoed

lobby and opulently draped windows. Our laptops and presenters' tags ready, we were part of The Central States Conference on the Teaching of Foreign Languages. Eagerly entering a display area filled with textbooks and computer programs booths for language teachers, we soon realized that the conference was dominated by a handful of well-established foreign languages. A fine presentation on college Spanish classes for bilingual students with a focus on culture and communication echoed our efforts to achieve both goals in our native languages in the Twin Cities. However, one of our aims in attending was to expose attendees to languages other than the dominant five (Spanish, French, German, Russian, and Chinese).

In our presentation, we summarized the history of the Czech & Slovak School Twin Cities, the solid collaboration with other organizations under the C.S.P.S's roof, and the benefits of knowing a heritage language. We laid out our vision and future goals for our school: to support our heritage language literacy, to achieve a higher level of proficiency resulting in broader employability, and to broaden intercultural awareness. We strive to give back to our own ethnic community and keep the connection between the United States and the European Union active. We know that other small local ethnicities share together with us the same goals. At the conference, we enjoyed a dialogue with representatives of a Greek school.

That evening, as the plane climbed away from Midway Airport we felt included, valued as language professionals, and with a renewed zeal to continue building our school. Our students must be prepared for the 21st century when being bilingual and possessing a deep understanding of a heritage language is starting to be a fully-supported American norm. It's never too late to join us!

## Twists and Turns: The Story of Sokol By NCSML Curator Stefanie Kohn

June 3 - December 31, 2017 • Smith Gallery • National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library

This June, American Sokol is holding the 2017 National *Slet* in Cedar Rapids from June 22 through 25. In honor of the *slet*, the NCSML presents a nimble and invigorating journey into the story of Sokol.

Named for the falcon, Sokol was founded in Prague in 1862 by Miroslav Tyrš and Jindřich Fügner. They believed that a nation must be physically fit, moral, and intelligent to secure its independence and retain it. Indeed, the overriding principal of Sokol is "a sound mind in a sound body." Gymnastics was the primary physical activity at the Sokol Hall, but lectures, skits and musical entertainment were also offered. Sokol was directly tied to Czech nationalism, and was carefully watched by the Habsburg Empire officials.

The first American Sokol unit was founded in 1865 in St. Louis, Missouri, only three years after the birth of Sokol in Prague. Within a few years, there were Sokols in Chicago, New York, Baltimore, Cedar Rapids, Cleveland, and in many other cities with Czech and Slovak populations. The Sokol provided a sense of community and belonging for immigrants. Like the Sokol in the Old Country, the units in the United States provided organized physical education, primarily in gymnastics, as well as social activities.

The exhibit pays homage to the amazing men and women who made Sokol a part of their lives, containing artifacts, images and stories from Sokol units across the United States. It is truly a communal effort to bring together uniforms, pins, awards, equipment, posters, photographs and video from these different organizations.

Visitors will see how Sokol grew and progressed in this country, and how a nation of immigrants across the ocean used Sokol to build strong American communities. Museum guests will even be able to participate in some fun activities while enjoying the exhibition. Mass calisthenics, anyone? Check your balance on the beam! Create a "human" pyramid!

While Sokol in the United States was overall a positive force,

the exhibit also recounts the perilous times throughout Czechoslovak history when Sokol was banned by various oppressive governments. Because of its pro-nationalist ideals, the Sokol movement in the Czech Lands was banned three times. During World War I, it was feared by the Austro-Hungarian authorities to be a training vehicle for a military that would rise against the Empire. The emphasis on national pride and union was also a threat to the Nazis, and Sokol did indeed become a resistance organization during World War II. After 1948, the communists took over Sokol and replaced the slet with a mass synchronized exercise festival called the Spartakiáda. The Spartakiáda was touted by the Party as an "endeavor to build a better future and contribute to world peace." Since 1990, Sokol in Czech Republic, Slovakia and the United States continues to evolve and grow while remaining true to the principals and ideals of its founders.

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## BOOK REVIEW By Gwen Willems, Ph.D. The Life and Times of Josef Škvoreckeý

Headed for the Blues: A Memoir by Josef Škvorecký. Translated by Káča Poláčková Henley. Hopewell, NJ: Ecco Press, 1997, 148 pages. Available in libraries and book stores.

Prolific Czech author Josef Škvorecký wrote more than 40 books, ten short story collections, two novellas, and dozens of essays on politics, literature, and cinema. Škvorecký's memoir, *Headed for the Blues*, focuses on political activities and nationalism at different points in his life. He spent an enjoyable childhood in Kostelec; then he lived through Nazi occupation during his youth and the prolonged communist years in his maturity, before he went into exile. Elements running throughout the narrative and contrasting with Škvorecký's own life are references to his friend Prema, a compliant proletariat for many years under communism. Škvorecký often mentions *fizl* (a pejorative term for an informer for the secret police) and the absurdity of so many killings under communism, "...the Ministry asked them to slow down, the executioners are exhausted, an execution is hard on the nerves, comrades..."

Occasionally the book is a chronological stream of consciousness that is not always appealing, especially when Škvorecký goes on for pages with no paragraph break. This 1997 English edition, translated by Káča Poláčková Henley, was followed in 1998 by one that added 10 stories and listed attributions after the author as "Káča Poláčková Henley with Caleb Crain, Peter Kussi, Paul Wilson, translator." I would love to know the story behind the supplemental assistants and re-publication.

Serious Škvorecký fans can garner details about his life. Helpful translators' notes key the reader to obscure references, such as lines from other authors' books and political incidents.

Škvorecký left Czechoslovakia for exile in Canada after the 1968 Soviet invasion. He and his wife, the talented writer and actor Zdena Salivarová, established Sixty-Eight Publishers, the Czechlanguage publisher, in Toronto. They were a literary life force for Czech authors including Václav Havel, Ivan Klíma, Milan Kundera, Ludvík Vaculík, and Jaroslav Seifert, publishing communist-banned works. Škvorecký's many honors included a Nobel Prize nomination (1982), *Order of the White Lion* by President Václav Havel (1990), and a *Guggenheim Fellow* and *Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada*. He died at 87 in 2012.


