Highlights of the Sokol Minnesota Board of Directors January 2024 Meeting By Tom Aubrecht from Recording Secretary Theresa Hudachek's Minutes

The Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota Board of Directors January 18, 2024, meeting was called to order by President Lucy Brudnak Rose at 7 p.m.

Cheryl Nelson presented an opportunity, which was approved, to co-sponsor with the Czech and Slovak Cultural Center of Minnesota a virtual presentation on March 16 by Paul Greeman, "Privatization in Slovakia and the Czech Republic." (See the ad on page 6.)

Honorary Czech Consul Marit Lee Kucera recommended The Community Reporter as a great place to advertise the rental possibilities that our C.S.P.S. Hall offers, as well as for Sokol Minnesota to show support for the West 7th/Little Bohemia neighborhood of which we have been a part for over 140 years. The proposal was approved. She also requested funds for supporting the International Film Festival; \$500 was approved.

Cinnamon Whaley noted the new website will be going live next Tuesday evening.

Ryan Cihlar, an accordion player, is offering to provide background music for events (dinners, etc.) at the Hall. President Lucy Rose will follow up with him.

Preparing an application for an American Sokol 2024 Foundation Award was considered. The award categories are: Gateway to the Future, Corporate Sustainability, and Unit Growth.

Electing Sokol Minnesota representatives to the Western District Board was discussed.

Promoting the Miss Czech Slovak Minnesota pageant more actively, and having Sokol Minnesota sponsor candidates, was discussed and approved.

Mary Cahill and Jason Brozovich noted gymnastics classes are in the second of three sessions. Enrollment continues to be down. Some gymnasts are training for the Western District Slet to be held April 27 at Sokol South Omaha. Long-time gymnast and coach, Mitchell Gillman, is in Basic Training in the Army. A coaching replacement is being sought.

Education Director Sally Lieberman provided the following information:

One Czech and one Slovak language class were cancelled because of not meeting the enrollment minimum. Alternatives were suggested for the students involved.

Sokol Minnesota is one of two host sites for the North American debut of the Czech program Virtual University of the Third Age (VU3V) that offers university courses for older adults. Our first course offering is "The Remarkable World of Mushrooms." We will officially launch it and start publicizing next Wednesday after the new website goes live.

An informational meeting via Zoom on Summer Language Study in the Czech Republic (programs in Poděbrady and Prague) with Ondřej Pometlo, Deputy Consul General/Chicago, and other speakers will be held via Zoom on Monday, February 5, at 7 p.m.

The Minneapolis-St. Paul International Film Festival (MSPIFF) will take place April 11-25. The list of films is not yet available. (See page 7.) **12 March 2024** *Slovo*

The Bohemian Flats Revisited program is scheduled for July 13 at 10 a.m. at Bohemian Flats Park in Minneapolis. It will include a history chat, stories and photos from descendants, and a tour of the newly-planted Oak Savannah area.

There is a possibility that Czech poet Petr Hruška will be here and could give a talk right around Easter (March 31). Renáta Tichá of the Czech and Slovak Cultural Center (CSCC) and Jitka Sebek of Czech & Slovak School Twin Cities are in touch with the tour organizers.

Master baker from the Czech Republic, Maškrtnica (www.maskrtnica.cz) will visit the Twin Cities in April and will hold two paid classes at the Hall on April 19 and 21. Míša Giancarlo Kotek and Jitka Sebek are the primary contacts.

Cross-Cultural Humanism: A Literary Gathering for Czech and Polish Communities will be held on April 27, 2024, 4 -7 p.m. at the Hall. The featured speaker is Polish Journalist and non-fiction writer Mariusz Szczygieł. Sokol Minnesota is a co-sponsor along with CSCC, Czech & Slovak School Twin Cities, and the Minnesota Polish Medical Society. A \$20 donation per person is suggested. Madeleine Albright's Insights Remain Pertinent

The Mighty and the Almighty: Reflections on America, God, and World Affairs by Madeleine Albright with Bill Woodward. HarperCollins: New York, 368 pages; 2006. Available at libraries and bookstores.

In this thought-provoking book, Madeleine Albright (1937-2022) examined the role of religion in United States foreign affairs. Our foreign policy officials used to downplay the role of religion in international affairs, in line with interpretation of the constitutional separation of church and state. Albright wrote that diplomats used to navigate by the concept of modernization, which she wrote, "many took as a synonym for secularization." Albright argued that with increasing religious warfare during the last decades, our political leaders cannot ignore the role of religion.

The Mighty and the Almighty is the second of Albright's seven books. As a former secretary of state, twentieth U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, international consultant, and distinguished professor, Albright was in an excellent position to provide this insightful, wise, and honest overview. She also had a unique personal experience of religion, having been born a Czech Jew, raised Catholic, and married Episcopalian. In this book, she used history, her personal experiences, and critiques to make her points. She discussed episodes from an impressive number of countries to exemplify larger issues and used detailed quotations that add to her credibility.

Although the book was published in 2006, a dramatically different time, her observations and lessons are still highly relevant today, when the Israel-Hamas War is raging and there are fears of conflict expanding across the region.

Religion is important to many people around the world and political actions are often based on religion, so it has to be part of international diplomacy. However, it is difficult, considering ingrained beliefs and how hard it is to understand other religions and cultures.

Is conflict inevitable? Albright wrote that, "People of diverse nations and faiths ought to be able to live in harmony. However, the gap between what ought to be and what actually is has been a recurring source of drama throughout human existence. Decades ago, Reinhold Niebuhr warned us that the brutality of nations and groups cannot be tamed no matter how hard we try. 'Social conflict,' he wrote, is 'an inevitability in human history, probably to its very end.'"

Albright brought a highly optimistic, forthright, can-do attitude to her work and her perspectives on America's international role, religion, and ethics in the currently divided world. As Bill Clinton wrote in his introduction, "... the only way to avoid stepping on toes is to stand still. Madeleine Albright is the embodiment of forward movement." Honoring separation of church and state, is it best for the United States to take a humanistic view and try to act morally, do what is right? Albright wrote of her childhood hero, Tomáš Masaryk, who "did not think it was necessary to believe in God to be moral, but he did argue that religious faith, properly understood, did much to encourage and strengthen right behavior. I have similar views."

Another way to look at it is through the lens of "just war," carried out by a competent authority with moral intentions for a cause that is right. This doctrine was developed over time by Saint Thomas Aquinas and Hugo Grotius. Today it is reflected in the Geneva Conventions and other secular international legal documents, according to Albright.

Religion can be used to avoid or end wars. Albright wrote

that, "The most famous example of faith-based peacemaking was orchestrated by President Jimmy Carter at Camp David in 1978. Most observers acknowledge that the peace agreement between Egypt and Israel would never have come about if not for Carter's ability to understand and appeal to the deep religious convictions of President Sadat and Prime Minister Begin."


In final reflections, Albright offered seven ideas about how America and the rest of the world can move forward: (1) Localize, don't globalize, (2) Remember who the enemy is, (3) Don't play with matches, (4) Develop a common understanding of what terrorism is,

(5) Talk about the treatment of women in a manner that leads to actual progress, (6) Christians, Muslims, and Jews should realize how much they have in common, and (7) Leaders should identify overlapping principles, ethics, and beliefs in the Judeo-Christian-Islamic tradition and pursue shared objectives.

Despite the topic, *The Mighty and the Almighty* was not as compelling as the other Albright books I have read— *Madame Secretary: A Memoir (2003), Prague Winter: A Personal Story of Remembrance and War, 1937–1948* (2012), and Fascism: A Warning (2018). If you are a student of politics, you are probably familiar with most of Albright's historical vignettes and can consider this book a refresher. For readers who are newcomers to politics, the historical anecdotes can be especially enlightening. The excellent notes and index sections help readers navigate all that Albright cites. In any case, the book is full of topics for thought and is a good one to keep returning to.

Czech Honorary Consul News March 2024 The Consulate of the Czech Republic/Chicago announced on February 2 that many Czech organizations in Minnesota, Iowa, and South Dakota are again 2024 recipients of grants from the Czech Ministry of Foreign Affairs: Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota, Saint Paul ... 275,000 CZK; Czech and Slovak Cultural Center of Minnesota, Saint Paul ... 70,000 CZK; Czech Heritage Club, New Prague ... 50,000 CZK; St. Mary's Preservation Association of Bechyn ... 50,000 CZK; Czech National Cemetery, Cedar Rapids ... 100,000 CZK.; National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library, Cedar Rapids 485,000 CZK; Czech Heritage Preservation Society, Tabor ... 245,000 CZK; plus 23 other organizations in the upper MidWest USA for a total of 3,855,000 CZK. According to Ondřej Pometlo, Deputy Consul General/Chicago, the Chicago Consulate continues to be the biggest distributor both in number of partners and in money. (Approximately 23 CZK = \$1 US in early February 2024).

At the New Year's Dinner on January 24 at C.S.P.S. Hall, it was rewarding to see several of the Czech and Slovak Roundtable Minnesota member organizations represented: Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota, Czech and Slovak Cultural Center of Minnesota, Czechoslovak Genealogical Society International, and Czech Heritage Club. The Roundtable has met quarterly since 2017 to promote cooperation, connection, conversation, and contact among the many Czech and Slovak organizations here in Minnesota.

One of my guests at the Czech Honorary Consul's table was Steve Riedel, who has often helped me connect with local and state

resources, ever since I became the Czech Honorary Consul in late 2015. Formerly with the Minnesota Trade Office, he is now the Corporate Relations Officer with Global Minnesota. Steve described how Global Minnesota has evolved from an international student-welcoming committee in 1951 to a multifaceted organization with a broad mission "to advance international understanding and engagement." Global Minnesota has hosted hundreds of professional exchange participants from around the world. https://globalminnesota.org

Elvira Elková, from Košice, Slovakia and a first-time diner at a Sokol Minnesota dinner, was one of the few people who already knew about Global Minnesota; it had been one of the first organizations that welcomed her upon arrival in Minnesota. She is a 2024 Humphrey Fellow. Named after the late Minnesota Senator and 38th U.S. Vice President, Hubert H. The 35th Annual Duchnovich Day Celebration by the Rusin Association of Minnesota on February 3, started with the presentation "Successful Carpatho-Rusyn Family Research" by Bill Tarkulich, one of the best-known Rusyn genealogists in the United States. Polly Walker, Eileen Jaszewski, Tammy Dennis, and Kim Johnson, who all have connections to St. Mary's Orthodox Cathedral in North East Minneapolis, explained their current genealogy projects, plus they met individually with audience members to help with their family research. Several 6' long *rushnyk* (ritual cloths) were given to her by a distant Rusyn cousin's wife in Slovakia, Her cousin had been a *starosta* (master of ceremony) at many weddings; it is the tradition for the bride to present a *rushnyk* to the *starosta*.
