Successful Flavors of Slovakia Dinner on March 10 By Theresa Hudachek



Over 80 guests gathered at the C.S.P.S. Hall on Sunday, March 10, for the annual Flavors of Slovakia dinner, the first sit-down Slovak dinner since before the pandemic.

We have had several successful curbside dinners, but there is nothing like a sit-down dinner for the enjoyment of eating with family and friends.

The meal started with a small glass of kefir, a fermented milk drink, followed by *kapustnica*, a soup with sauerkraut, sausage, dried mushroom and spices, plus homemade bread from The Czech Baker.

We tried to get the soup recipe to print in this *Slovo*, but we were told there is no recipe! The cooks do not have measurements for the ingredients; they cook to taste. And it definitely tasted great!









The main course was *Bryndzové halušky* (potato dumplings with bryndza sheep cheese, bacon, and green onion tops) along with *holubky*, a meat-stuffed cabbage roll with tomato sauce. Finishing it all off was an amazing *krémeš*, a puff pastry with whipped cream and pudding.

Announcing the Sokol Minnesota Youth Leadership Award for 2024 By Louise Wessinger

The Sokol Minnesota Youth Leadership Award is a way to encourage and recognize outstanding participation of youth members and to foster a future generation of members and leaders for our Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota organization.

Up to three Sokol Minnesota youths will receive the award and a \$500 cash prize; \$400 each from Sokol Minnesota, plus \$100 each contributed by the Honorary Czech Consul M. L. Kucera. A separate award with a \$100 prize is given for the Best Essay, donated by Louise Wessinger. Applications for the 2024 Youth Leadership Awards open on April 1.

The criteria for this award are as follows:

Applicants must be in their junior or senior year of high school. Their parent(s) need to be paid and active members of Sokol Minnesota for at least the current and preceding calendar year (2023 and 2024).

Applicants must actively participate in one or more Sokol Minnesota youth activities, such as Taneční Teen dancers, Sokol gymnastics, Czech and Slovak Children's Cultural Day Camp, or Sokol Minnesota Youth Link; or actively participate in Czech & Slovak School Twin Cities activities; and be a regular volunteer at Sokol Minnesota events. Of course, over the last few years, because of COVID, some activities and events have not been held, so prior activity involvement and volunteer help with our curbside or other events will be considered.

Applicants will be expected to complete the Youth Leadership Award application form outlining their activity participation, write a 300-word-maximum essay about how their participation in Sokol Minnesota activities has impacted their life, have a participation verification form signed by an adult director of their youth activity, a letter of recommendation from an adult director, and forms signed by adult leaders of Sokol Minnesota events where the applicant was a volunteer.

Applications must be submitted by July 1, 2024. All forms and further details can be found after April 1 on our website, www.sokolmn.org/YLA

Applicants can apply multiple times, but may receive the award only once. The Leadership and Best Essay Award recipients will be announced by September 1. All awards will be presented at the annual Sokol Minnesota Czech & Slovak Festival on September 29.

WWII The Accidental Hero Performance by Patrick Dewane on Saturday, April 13

7 p.m. drama performance with music starting at 6 p.m.

The Accidental Hero is the jaw-dropping true story about Czech freedom at the end of World War II. U.S. Army Colonel Matt Konop, as a unit commander, liberated the remote border villages his grandparents had left decades earlier for America. When he was able to use the Czech he grew up speaking on a Wisconsin farm, the Czech townspeople hailed him as a hero. "We are liberated by one of our own!"

The experience altered Konop's sense of identity, freeing him from an ignorance of his Czech heritage.

His grandson, Patrick Dewane, tells this amazing story through a multi-media one-man show that has toured over a hundred venues across the United States and has earned awards in the Czech Republic.

Before the show, starting at 6 p.m., Pavel Jany, Czechborn Minnesota jazz musician, performs as the crowd arrives. After the performance, national award-winning Minnesota writer Patricia Hampl interviews Dewane about

the show, his upcoming annual tour in the Czech Republic, and takes questions from the audience. Wine, beer, and *zelnicky* (sauerkraut crackers) available to purchase.

BIG DREAMS (Déti Nagana), 2023, 101 minutes. Directed by Daniel Pánek. Czech Republic. Languages: Czech with English subtitles. Monday, April 15 at 1:50 p.m., Saturday, April 20 at 11:15 a.m. Inspired by the Czechs winning the gold at the 1998 Olympics, 11year-old Dom suddenly pictures himself becoming a star goalie like his idol Dominik Hašek. The only problem is his parents doubt his



abilities and are unwilling to support what they perceive as yet another one of his short-lived interests. Plus, he doesn't know how to skate. In this Bad News Bears style dramedy, a plucky middle schooler recruits a handful of other underestimated small-town kids and builds a team on the sly. With a little help, the kids ingeniously figure out how to play hockey, and soon face off a tougher, more experienced team from the next village. After taking a few hits, Dom and friends show themselves and their community what's possible, learning that nobody is more than a team, and no dream is too big. Age 10+. Director's bio: Daniel Pánek (1988, Prague) is a filmmaker whose feature credits include *Taxi 121* (2016) and *The Show* (2020).



WE HAVE NEVER BEEN MODERN (Usvit), 2023, 117 minutes. Directed by Matěj Chlupáček. Czech Republic and Slovakia. English subtitles. Sunday, April 14 at 1:45 p.m., Tuesday, April 23 at 7:10 p.m.

The discovery of a dead intersex infant amidst the rubble in the newly built factory town of Svit in 1937 sends shockwaves through a society fixated on only one kind of progress. This masterfully-crafted drama about privilege, prejudice, and gender identity features a memorably tart-

tongued heroine in pregnant Helena (Eliška Křenková), the beautiful young wife of slick factory manager Alois (Miroslav Konig). Helena, who dropped out of medical school, is serving as a nurse for a few hours each day at the factory. As she follows up on her own theory about the dead infant with her former mentor, and confronts the fears and biases of her new social coterie, her illusions about the happy life that awaits her soon perish. The smartly-written film encompasses a character study, a marital drama, and a detective mystery, while also dropping hints about the historical disaster soon to come.

WHITE PLASTIC SKY (Műanyag égbolt), 2023, 111 minutes. Directed by Tibor Bánóczki and Sarolta Szabó. Co-production: Hungary with Slovakia. English subtitles. Wednesday, April 17 at 9:40 p.m., Tuesday, April 23 at 2 p.m.



In the future, humans live in a biodome, where they're

implanted with a seed that turns them into a tree for needed oxygen. In this animated dystopian film, set in 2123, people are compliant to surrender their body at age 50 to the greater good of survival. But when Nora, a grief-stricken woman, elects to undergo her implant early, her husband Stefan is in a race against time to reverse the process. Using eyepopping rotoscoping techniques, Hungarian animation duo Tibor Bánóczki and Sarolta Szabó, working with leading geologists, botanists, and meteorologists in their home country, have created a dystopian future like you've never seen before. Part love story, part dystopia, part eco-fantasia, *White Plastic Sky* is a pure cinematic experience.



GREEN BORDER (Zielona Granica), 2023, 147 minutes. Directed by Agnieszka Holland. Co-Production: Poland, France, the Czech Republic, and Belgium. English subtitles. Friday, April 12 at 3:50 p.m., Sunday, April 14 at 6:50 p.m.

A family of Syrian refugees, an English teacher from Afghanistan, and a border guard all meet on the Polish-Belarusian border during

the recent humanitarian crisis in Belarus. At the "green border," an almost impassable swamp between Poland and Belarus, the immigrants struggle to reach the former, which is doing everything possible to keep them out, with traumatic results. Agnieszka Holland, one of the world's greatest living filmmakers, has focused her camera on her native Poland in this devastating film about the refugee crisis. Shot documentary-style, and from a shifting perspective (from refugees to border guards), Holland's magnum opus takes a god's eye view of this immigrant crisis, and the result is a stunning work of filmmaking. Acclaimed around the world, but condemned in Poland, *Green Border* must not be missed.

Czech Music at C.S.P.S. Hall Celebrates the Czech Year of Music By Renáta Tichá



After the concert, the musicians took questions from the audience. Saint Paul was the Duo's last stop on this their seventh tour of the United States. On Sunday, March 10, we had the privilege to hear Czech classical music at the C.S.P.S. Hall performed by Ambroš Duo Prague, with Zuzana Ambroš on the piano and Miroslav Ambroš on violin. The concert was organized by the Czech and Slovak Cultural Center (CSCC) and co-sponsored by Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota and the Honorary Consulate of the Czech Republic/Minneapolis to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the birth of the renowned Czech composer, Bedřich Smetana (1824-1864).

2024 has been designated the *Year of Music* in the Czech Republic. It was fortuitous that along with Smetana, the Ambroš Duo Prague also played pieces by Antonín Dvořák, in the same building where Dvořák himself attended a concert in his honor in 1893. In addition, the Duo played a violin solo from *Radúz and Mahulena, Op. 16* by Josef Suk. Interestingly, Miroslav trained under Suk's descendent.

Highlights of the Sokol Minnesota Board of Directors February 2024 Meeting

The Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota Board of Directors (BOD) meeting of February 15, 2024, was called to order by President Lucy Brudnak Rose at 7 p.m.

Membership Director Steve Ernest, who led the most recent Sokol Minnesota By-Laws update, noted that appointment of a Rental Committee Chair who is an elected BOD member is needed. This will facilitate regular reporting from the committee.

Following the January BOD Retreat, several items need follow-up:

Lucy Rose noted we have had many requests to host events at the C.S.P.S. Hall over the next few months. A committee is proposed to review the cost per hour for use of various Hall spaces by Sokol Minnesota-affiliated vs. external groups. Joyce Tesarek will bring this issue to the Finance committee to get a current breakdown. The review will include contacting other civic organizations to get information on how they treat such requests. The committee will bring a proposed rental fee rubric to the BOD for approval. Clarifying our relationship with the Czech & Slovak School Twin Cities (*Škola*) will be an additional goal of the committee.

Lucy also noted Sokol South Omaha is hosting the 2024 Western District Slet on April 27, 2024. They are requesting a donation for their Trophy Fund (we have donated to this in the past), as well as a \$50 donation toward the Special Assessment Fund. This was tabled to an email vote until more information is received from Mary Cahill or Jason Brozovich.

Education Director Sally Lieberman raised for discussion whether individuals should be paid for presenting Sokol Minnesota-sponsored events vs. expected to volunteer. Jean Draheim will connect with Sally to discuss the difference between classes and activities. Activities Director Jeannie Draheim: For *The Accidental Hero* performance at the Hall on April 13, a budget for incidentals of up to \$150 was requested; this was approved. A *Slovo* subscription price increase from \$15 to \$20 has been suggested because of the increased cost of printing and postage. The increase was approved.

Education Director Sally Lieberman confirmed details for the Dumpling Master Class on March 17. For the Petr Hruska poetry event on March 29, \$150 for refreshments and having a donation basket were approved.

Budget and Finance Committee Chair Joyce Tesarek noted the committee is managing treasurer tasks while the position is open. The account balances were reported. Regarding the Czech Ministry Grant, *Škola* needs to request awarded grant funds from Sokol Minnesota. ASO grants will be requested in three catagories.

Membership Director Steve Ernest presented four people for membership; they were approved. Of the total of 327 members, 90 still owe the renewal fee. Steve will send another reminder.

Gaming Manager Ed Hamernik presented and received approval for the January Actual Expenditure and the February Budget. Transferring the City of Saint Paul tax error refund to our General Fund was approved.

Building and Property Trustees Committee Chair Bob Kotek reported that a bid was received from Discount Window for replacing five windows. Replacing the windows has received approval from the Saint Paul Historical Preservation group. The details have been submitted to Finance for preparing a grant request. For AC to cool the Hall dining room, details have also been submitted to finance for a grant request. Meetings are being scheduled with two additional elevator companies for upgrades and maintenance contract consideration.

Seven Notable Czech Women

Seven Czech Women: Portraits of Courage, Humanism, and Enlightenment by Josette Baer. Columbia University Press: New York, 200 pages; 2015. Available at libraries and bookstores.

Seven Czech Women: Portraits of Courage, Humanism, and Enlightenment is the first historical study in English portraying the lives and fates of Czech women. These three oral histories and four narratives give us views on disparate Czech women's lives from the 1870s on.

The author, Josette Baer, a Swiss researcher and adjunct professor at the University of Zurich, also wrote a volume on seven Slovak women. Read together, the books show differences in political circumstances in the recent history of Czech and Slovak women. She includes a helpful abbreviation list, chronology, bibliography, and index in

this book. Baer's 1996 Ph.D. dissertation was titled Politics as Pragmatic Morality. The Notion of Democracy in the Political Thought of Tomáš G. Masaryk and Václav Havel.

I was drawn to *Seven Czech Women* when I was looking for material in English on **Milada Horáková** (1901-1950). The chapter on her is detailed and lengthy and her tragic biography inspiring and sad.

Before WWII, Horáková was a prominent member of the Czechoslovak Socialist Party, lawyer, advocate for women's rights, and mother. After the annexation of the Czech lands, she joined the resistance. Horáková was

arrested by the Nazis in 1940 and imprisoned until released by American forces in 1945. She was elected to the Czech National Assembly, but forced to resign when the Communist Party took power in 1948.

The communists soon embarked on a brutal course of eliminating the opposition, real or not. Citizens were to be "ideologically disciplined." According to Baer, "veterans of both wars, members of Masaryk's *légie* [Czechoslovak Legion], intellectuals and politicians who had survived Nazi concentration camps, bishops, priests, and vicars, members of Beneš' exile government [1939-1945] and everybody representing the values of the first republic had to be silenced." As a proponent of democracy and a friend of Beneš', Horáková was targeted.

She was arrested by the communists in 1949, subjected to the first communist show trial, and convicted. This tireless advocate for improving the lives of Czechs was executed by hanging in 1950.

I was also fascinated by the chapter on Alice Garrigue Masaryková (1879-1966), daughter of Tomáš Masaryk, founding father and president of Czechoslovakia from 1918-1935. She studied history and philosophy at Charles Ferdinand University in Prague and taught at a girls' high school. She was jailed by the Austrians for nine months in 1915-1916 on false charges of anti-Austrian activities. Using her skills and interest in medicine and social work, she went on to found the Czechoslovak Red Cross in 1919 and chair it, fighting contagious diseases and hunger. After her mother Charlotte died, Alice took on Charlotte's role as First Lady of the Czechoslovak Republic, joining her father on official state visits and receptions.

The other profiles vary in length, quality, and criteria. Baer wrote that she had three criteria: that the women have a Czech cultural and political identity; visibility in the Czech, Czechoslovak, and international public eye; and physical presence in the Czech lands. However, Baer made three exceptions to them. In addition to Horáková and Masaryková, the profiled women include:

Ema Destinn (1878-1930), an internationally famous opera singer, Czech patriot, and supporter of an independent Czechoslovakia. She introduced the music of the top Czech composers to the world by translating libretti by Bedřich

Smetana and Antonin Dvořák into German. Her singing career peaked with a New York Metropolitan Opera contract.

Eva 'Mimi' Jiránková (1921-2015), Czechoslovak citizen born in Prague who lived under the First Republic's democracy and the Nazi occupation. Her husband survived Terezin and Auschwitz; he was not Jewish but his stepfather was a member of Beneš' exile government in Great Britain. When he was released in 1948, they fled with their daughter, eventually settling in Great Britain, where Eva worked as a fashion consultant. After 1989, she visited Prague regularly.

Věra Čáslavská (b. 1942), gymnast who won Olympic medals in Tokyo in 1964 and Mexico City in 1968, two months after Warsaw Pact troops invaded Czechoslovakia. Baer considers her the most successful female athlete in Czech history. Čáslavská signed Ludvik Vaculík's anticommunist 2000 Words manifesto in 1968. Because of this, she was unemployed for five years and became persona non grata.

Nataša Lišková (b. 1949), children's magazine writer, production assistant in Czech television, and later freelance journalist. She was asked to join the Communist Party and to become an informer for the St.B, both of which she declined. As a result, she was blacklisted in 1984.

Tereza Maxová (b. 1971), the first internationally known Czech model in the early 1990s. She founded the Tereza Maxová Foundation, which helps neglected and homeless Czech children. She says the foundation "fills the gap between what the state provides and what the abandoned children need."

Czech Honorary Consul News April 2024



The Czech Republic, along with Poland and Hungary, commemorated their 25th anniversary of accession to NATO (North Atlantic Treaty

Organization) on 12 March at the Harry S. Truman Presidential Museum and Library in Independence, Missouri. The original treaty with these three nations was signed at the Truman

Library on 12 March 1999. At that signing, Czech-born Madeleine Albright, US Secretary of State (1997-2001), stated, "Another great gift the Czech Republic, Poland, and Hungary bring to our Alliance for freedom is the living memory of living without freedom. NATO's success has enabled generations protected by the Alliance to grow up and grow old under democratic rule."

The original NATO treaty was signed by President Truman, 75 years ago (4 April 1949) with 12 countries; today there are 32, with Finland (2023) and Sweden (2024) as the newest members.

This Commemoration Wreath stood in front of the tomb of President Harry S.
