And although our Sokol children's dance and gymnastics groups take a break from weekly practices during their summer vacation, those practices will resume in the coming weeks in preparation for delighting our festival guests with their wonderful performances. With the summer coming to an end, several of our regular classes will resume meeting this month, either online or in person at the C.S.P.S. Hall. If you are interested in learning a new language, we offer beginner, advanced beginner, and advanced Czech classes, and for those interested in learning the Slovak language, we have an elementary-level class.

We also offer opportunities for more physical engagement, at both the adult and children's levels. If you have kids, they might enjoy learning Czech and Slovak folk dances with the Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota children's dance group, led by our long-time dance director Louise Wessinger. The perfect time for new kids to join the group is in early October, right after our festival. The one-hour practices are on Saturday morning each week at the C.S.P.S. Hall.

Sokol Minnesota also offers several ways for adults to get physically active, including weekly kung fu and tai chi classes on Wednesday evenings at the C.S.P.S. Hall and group bicycle rides with the Kolo Sokol Bike Club on the third Sunday of each month. (The last ride for this year will be in October.) I'm so grateful to the dedicated Sokol Minnesota members who volunteer their time to coordinate and teach all of these wonderful programs for our youth and adult members. While it's great to take a break from our weekly programs during the summer so that families can travel and spend time doing other things, I'm proud that Sokol Minnesota provides opportunities for our membership to come together again and maintain our community as the days get shorter and the weather turns cooler.

Nineteen Countries Participated in the 2024 All-Sokol *Slet* XVII

Czech President Petr Pavel helped to open the *Slet* on Thursday night, July 4. Martin Chlumský, head of the Czech Sokol Organization/Česká obec sokolská (ČOS), said, "We have been leading Czechs towards physical activity and communal engagement for 162 years, and I am immensely pleased that we can enjoy our togetherness in such an amazing atmosphere. The *Slet* unites. It unites generations, sport with art, regions and this country with the world. Today, we can be here as one big Sokol family, sharing the same values."

Based on the principle of "a strong mind in a sound body," the Sokol movement was founded in Prague in 1862 by Miroslav Tyrš and Jindřich Fügner. Twenty years later, the first All-Sokol *Slet* was held in 1882; it was a men-only event. In 1920, women finally participated as equal partners. Wars and politics might have interrupted these international Gatherings (*Slety*) of Falcons (Sokols) from happening every six years, but Sokols kept performing their *prostná* (mass synchronized calisthenic gymnastic drills) along with competitions in gymnastics and other sports, parades, and cultural events.

In addition to the sextennial All-Sokol *Slet* in Prague, American Sokol has a national *Slet* every four years, and Sokol Districts hold an annual *Slet* of units within their district. The district and national gatherings continue to provide Sokol members the opportunity to practice, perform, and stay united. But the penultimate opportunity for unity is at an All-Sokol *Slet* in Prague. *Nazdar*!





Much to the delight of Sokols, the band had learned a Sokol march just for the occasion. **3.** At the end of the gala on Tuesday night, July 2, all the Sokol elite athletic performers gathered on the floor of O2 Arena in Prague to great applause and cheering. **4.** The opening flag ceremony was held on the open field in the rain. *Slet* performances occur rain or shine. Much of the cheering audience luckily was under the overhang of the stadium and stayed dry the entire night. **5.** Two of the *prostná* on Thursday involved intricate patterns that made for spectacular viewing and great photos. One was *Babí léto prostná*. **6.** The other was *V rytmu srdce*.

One of the most moving scenes of the entire Slet was watching senior Loyal Guard members performing from their chairs and wheelchairs in sync with their Loyal Guard compatriots on the field. There was hardly a dry eye in that section of the stadium. Long live Sokol! 6. Čmeláčci, an audience-favorite prostná, involved very small children, some just toddlers, and their parents, synchronized in field exercises together and also in their own separate routines.

Bohemian Flats Park Gathering by Cheryl Nelson

On Saturday, July 13, 2024, there was a joyous gathering of Bohemian River Flats descendants and interested guests at the Bohemian Flats Park in Minneapolis on the west bank of the Mississippi River near the Washington Avenue Bridge and next to the University of Minnesota campus. The Hildegard String Quintet from Minnetonka High School welcomed participants by playing Dvořák and other delightful pieces of music.

Four speakers focused on their families and how the Flats played a part in the evolution of their families' journeys. Sally Lieberman, the educational director at Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota, kicked off the discussion with a fascinating history of the Bohemian River Flats starting from its origin to the present day.

The second speaker was Brenda Bastis Rodgers, a Czech descendant. She spoke of the Bastis family, and how they emerged from the Flats as successful entrepreneurs. Albert Bastis, the great-uncle of Brenda Bastis Rodgers, was a prominent politician in Hennepin County from 1914–1956. He also assisted in the creation of the Sister Kenny Institute's wing for children with polio and the Pig's Eye Island Wastewater Treatment Plant, as well as many other programs that benefited the people of Minneapolis.

The third speaker was Cheryl Nelson, who discussed her Slovak grandparents, the Michalko family, living on the Flats; her mother was the last of her family to be born there. The Michalko family was one of at least five Slovak families, including the Michalko, Stanko, Michalek, Pafko, and Balco families, that moved to Blackduck, Minnesota to farm.

The fourth speaker was a tag team of Michelle Wilson and Gary Nalevanko, who talked at length about their family connections to the Flats and how their family bought land in northern Minnesota to log. They also played a recording of their aunt Mary Harmata speaking about her experience growing up on the Flats. Her favorite childhood memory was of sledding down a hill toward the river.

The last speaker was Tyler Pederson, a landscape architect and design project manager for the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board. He discussed the evolution of the park, the new addition of landscaping, and what the future might hold for the Bohemian Flats Park.

A number of people who attended also discussed their family connections, how the Slovak Lutheran Church impacted the neighborhood, and the interesting fact that most of the residents from the Slovak Republic came from the towns of Štrba or Važec in the eastern part of the Slovak Republic. There may be informal gatherings in the future of Flat descendants to share stories and information.

Huge thanks to Sally Lieberman and her thoughtful concept and planning of this incredibly special event for the community.

The Book of Prague with Patrik Banga by Gwen Willems



Sokol Minnesota members, Hubal family members, interested scholars, and community members attended an informational presentation given by Dr. Wendy Waszut-Barrett, PhD, on July 21, 2024. Dr. Waszut-Barrett spoke about Hubal's personal and professional history and his place in the early 20th century art world. She also stressed the importance of Sokol's collection, its value, and the need to restore and preserve the artwork.



BOOK REVIEW The Beautiful Water Nymph Rusalka Continues to Charm By Gwen Willems, Ph.D.

Rusalka

Jaroslav Kvapil

Rusalka by Jaroslav Kvapil, translated from the Czech by Patrick John Corness. Karolinum Press: Prague, 135 pages, 2021. Available at libraries and bookstores.

Rusalka was written as a poem by Czech poet, playwright, translator, and theater director Jaroslav Kvapil in 1898. He had just spent the summer on a Danish island immersed in

Hans Christian Anderson's *The Little Mermaid*, Božena Němcová's *Folk Tales and Legends*, and K. J. Erben's *Kytice*. Compared to the Scandinavian *Little Mermaid*, Kvapil's *Rusalka* has a more complex protagonist, refined poetic techniques, a dramatic pace, and gloomy undertones. *Rusalka*, which tells the story of a Slavic water nymph who must choose between love and immortality, is a distinct work of modern Czech literature.

During the next year, after completing a libretto of *Rusalka*, Kvapil met with the well-established composer Antonín Dvořák, who happened to be interested in finding a fairy tale for another opera. Dvořák accepted the libretto almost virtually as written.

First performed in Prague in 1901 with soprano Růžena Maturová singing the title role, the opera quickly became the most successful of Dvořák's operas and most popular of all Czech operas after Smetana's *The Bartered Bride*. Today it is among the standard repertoires of opera houses worldwide.

In 2021, the Karolinum Press in Prague published, in its Modern Czech Classics series, an edition of this lyric poem newly translated by Patrick John Corness, who works in English, Czech, German, Polish, Russian, and Ukrainian. This edition includes side-by-side Czech and English pages and is accompanied by wistful watercolor illustrations by Jiři Grus, plus author and translator biographies, an afterword, and translator's notes.

Rusalka tells of the tragic conflict of incompatible worlds. A beautiful water nymph with long golden hair who lives in a supernatural world falls in love with a prince in a natural world. When she tells her father the water goblin that she has fallen in love with a prince and wants to become human to be with him, he tells her it is a bad idea but refers her to a witch, Ježibaba. If Rusalka becomes human, she will lose speech and immortality. If their love does not work out, he will die and she will be eternally damned. Ježibaba tells Rusalka:

For if this love you crave you cannot keep, my curse will draw you back into the deep. Before you gain this love you'll suffer dear – no word you say will human hear.

Rusalka is deeply in love and describes her encounters with the prince:

He comes here often, yes, and by the weir disrobes, He enters my embrace; held in my arms he bathes, but I am just a wave, it's true, a being hidden from his view. I know that human form, first of all, I must assume. Then when once more he comes and I wind him in my arms he too will hold me close, with hot passion in his kiss.

She seeks comfort from the moon:

O silver moon, give him a sign, my arms it is that him entwine.

And may he dream he's with me once again, for just a moment, now and then.

Light up his path and say who here awaits him every day.

If his human soul dreams of me,

may he wake with this memory.

Dear moon, don't fade away, oh don't fade!

The water is so cold, so cold!

Rusalka and the prince plan their wedding, but the prince is fickle and flirts with another woman who has come for the ceremony. Rusalka is rebuffed and returns to the water, but the prince realizes he truly loves her. Rusalka says to the prince:

Once I could give you love, plight my troth, now all I bring to you is death.

The prince replies:

Without you I cannot live, Can you, can you still forgive?

At the end, the prince tells Rusalka:

Kiss me, kiss me, grant me peace, let worldly joys for ever cease. Kiss me to death, kiss me please.

Rusalka kisses him, and as he dies he says:

My sin shall be absolved by your kiss. Happy I die, held in your embrace!

I have been fortunate to see three distinctly different versions of the opera *Rusalka*. One put on by the Minnesota Opera was minimally staged, another in the Czech Republic was a colorful water show accompanied by music, and the third was a beautiful, full staging by the Met Opera with the incomparable Renée Fleming as the beguiling water nymph. The opera *Rusalka* is a delightful combination of music, romance, and fairy tale.

I enjoyed all three productions and am pleased to add a reading of the beautiful original poem to my experiences.

In celebration of the 50th anniversary of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library (NCSML) in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, the museum is adding an orloj clock to the remodeled outdoor clock tower. The dedication is September 21. The clock is modeled after the famous Prague Orloj, the 15th-century astronomical clock attached to the Old Town Hall in Prague, which tells the position of the sun, moon, and zodiac constellations in addition to 24-hour time. While the figurines in the Prague Orloj are the 12 apostles, the dozen figurines in the NCSML orloj will tell the Czech, Moravian, and Slovak immigrant story, including a farmer, a meatpacker, a beekeeper, and a coal miner. Current honorary consuls of the Czech Republic here in the United States are sponsoring the merchant figurine.

Established in 1974, NCSML preserves the historic and cultural heritage of the Czech and Slovak people in North America. Congress recognized it in 1992 as the official national Czech and Slovak museum and library. NCSML became a Smithsonian Affiliate in 2019. https://ncsml.org
