Prezidentčin komentář/President's Notes by Bob Kotek

It's a new year, 2025, and I would like to provide a brief introduction of myself for the Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota membership as I begin my term as president.

I was born and raised in the Montgomery area, the son of fourth-generation Czech parents; my ancestors first arrived and homesteaded land just outside of New Prague in 1860. Czech was the primary language of my parents, but unfortunately my siblings and I did not maintain that part of our heritage. My dad always referred to our heritage as "Bohemian," as was common back in the day. We enjoyed Czech cuisine, Kolacky Days, and many Czech customs

My wife Michaela (Míša) was born in Czechoslovakia (before the Velvet Divorce with Slovakia) and, together with our children, we were able to realize a long-term desire of mine to live in the Czech Republic for three years, 2014–2017. We lived in Míša's hometown of Ostrava and traveled throughout the country, as well as to many other countries around the world.

Upon our return, I became more involved at Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota, beginning with small volunteer opportunities. In 2020, I began a nearly five-year role as chair of the Building and Property Trustees Committee (BPTC). This proved to be a special time for me. With our very dedicated group of volunteers, we accomplished many improvements and enhancements to the building. Through this role, I became acquainted with many aspects of the Sokol organization, the people involved, and their efforts to develop and deliver all the wonderful activities and events for Sokol membership and the general public.

I would like to recognize the following Sokol members who have volunteered to fill Board of Director positions beginning in 2025: Lucy Rose (Recording Secretary), Tereza Treaner (Publicity Director), Denise Stibal (Corresponding Secretary), and Dave Stepan (Chair, Building and Property Trustees Committee). Lucy and Dave, as past presidents of Sokol

Minnesota, continue to play vital roles in our organization.

I also want to share that we have a new neighbor in our West Seventh neighborhood! On December 18, I attended the grand opening of Viengchan Oriental Market, a new Asian grocery store that opened in the former home of Cooper's Foods, directly across the street from the C.S.P.S. Hall. During the dedication, the owners talked of their own journey as immigrants coming to the United States. This made me think of our own ancestors arriving in a new country over 160 years ago with the same hopes and dreams for a new life. *Nazdar!*





On Friday December 3, along with two of my Sokol Minnesota presidential predecessors, Dave Stepan and Lucy Rose, we welcomed Pader Heurh Vang, one of the Viengchan store owners, to the neighborhood. Pader was very interested to hear about the Czech and Slovak immigrants who first came to this area over 150 years ago. We presented her with a copy of Joe Landsberger's 400+-page book, *Origin Story of Fort Road*. Not pictured: M. L. Kucera, Honorary Czech Consul, who accompanied us and took this picture.

2025 Leaders Elected at Sokol Minnesota's Annual Membership Meeting in November

The annual meeting of Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota was held on Friday, November 22, at our C.S.P.S. Hall. President Lucy Rose welcomed members, listed the many accomplishments of our unit in 2024, and read the names of members who had 5, 10, 15 to 70 years of membership (see list on page 5, *Slovo*, December 2024-January 2025 issue).

Each November, Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota holds its Annual Membership Meeting, with half the Board of Directors up for election or re-election. Most Board positions are for two years. Some officer positions, such as president, vice president, and secretaries have term limits of (two) two-year terms. Committee chairs are elected to serve on the Board.

Remembering Dorothy Mulko Kucera

The St. Paul Czech and Slovak Folk Dancers wish to acknowledge the passing of one of its founders, Dorothy Mulko Kucera. She was instrumental in starting the dance group in 1962. She died on July 6, 2024, just five days before her 90th birthday.

Dorothy was the daughter of immigrants from Ratíškovice, Moravia, Czechoslovakia, who settled on a farm in Dominion City, Manitoba, Canada. As a young woman, Dorothy moved to Minneapolis to work for Pan American Airways. There she met Vera Verner, whose family were active members of Sokol Saint Paul, now known as Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota. Dorothy and Vera, with enthusiastic support from many Sokol members, thought that the Czechoslovak community should have a dance group.

They were able to secure support from CSA Fraternal Life, which owned the C.S.P.S. Hall at the time. With help from other local folk dance groups, the group began to meet on Monday evenings. They learned *Česká beseda*, as that was the only folk dance that was taught at the time. They also did many international dances to improve their dance skills. Working for Pan Am, Dorothy was able to bring music from Czechoslovakia and the group was

gradually able to add more Czech, Moravian, and Slovak dances to their programs. Probably the most exciting thing Dorothy brought back was when she went to her family village and returned with several trunks full of folk dress (*kroje*) that people gave her to take to America for the dance group, so the dancers here would look authentic.

The St. Paul Czech and Slovak Folk Dancers are very grateful to Dorothy and Vera (who died September 11, 2019) for their enthusiasm in beginning a dance group that



has brought much joy to not only all those who have danced with the group, but also those who have enjoyed seeing the group perform.

Thomas Gurke: Franz Kafka, Kafka's Novella *The Metamorphosis*, and Its Adaptations by Gwen Willems

On November 15, Thomas Gurke gave a fascinating talk at the C.S.P.S. Hall commemorating Franz Kafka's death 100 years ago in 1924. A recent research interest of Dr. Gurke is Kafka's The Metamorphosis.



The Metamorphosis remains Kafka's most popular work and has had many adaptations made of it. They include a Charlie Brown version and one called *The Meowmorphosis*, supposedly written by both Franz Kafka and Coleridge Cook. The Meowmorphosis begins, "One morning, as Gregor Samsa was waking up from anxious dreams,

he discovered that he had been changed into an adorable kitten." His family doesn't know what to do about this

man-sized kitten, who is cute but not able to pay the bills.

For a fun way to get to know more about Franz Kafka. Gurke suggests the graphic novel *Kafka*, which blends biographical vignettes with reworkings of Kafka's literary pieces. It is written by David Zane Mairowitz and illustrated by Robert Crumb. This combination biography and literary adaptation uses comics-style art to explore Kafka's many neuroses and his relationship with his critical, overbearing father.

Thomas Gurke, Ph.D., is a visiting professor and director of graduate studies for his department at the University of Minnesota: he has a degree in English literature and musicology.

Tatra: The Legacy of Hans Ledwinka by Ivan Margolius and John G. Henry. SAF Publishing: Harrow, United Kingdom, 160 pages, 1990. Available at libraries and used bookstores.

Tatra: The Legacy of Hans Ledwinka is a remarkably thorough and detailed history of the Tatra automobile and its principal designer. The book covers Ledwinka's life, the company's background, relevant European history, and Tatra vehicle models and their workings. Numerous photos and

intricate technical drawings enrich the story. The book is enhanced by a foreword by Ledwinka's son Erich, a chronology, a table of in-depth information regarding Nesselsdorf/Tatra passenger cars and commercial vehicles, a bibliography, and an index.

The authors, both architects, share an interest in the history, development, and innovation of motor cars. They are also great admirers of Ledwinka, a brilliant, often under-acknowledged visionary in vehicle development and technology. He can be compared to Karl Friedrich Benz, Gottlieb Daimler, and Ferdinand Porsche. As Margolius and Henry write, "In seventy


years of active involvement, of which forty were spent in heading the Tatra factory, Ledwinka the individualist was frequently regarded as a design genius."

Ledwinka was born in 1878, when passenger transportation was by horse-drawn carriage. In his late teens, he came to work at the wagon factory in Nesselsdorf (Kopřivnice in Czech) in northeastern Moravia, later to become the Tatra company, named for the beautiful Tatra Mountains, 100 miles to the east. In 1895, plant managers decided to construct Nesseldorf's first automobile. Ledwinka was interested and eager to take part. The result was the Präsident (1897), the first factory-produced automobile with a petrol engine to be made in Central and Eastern Europe. The Präsident's engineering was directed by Ledwinka and Edmund Rumple, an automotive and aviation pioneer.

Twenty-two Nesselsdorf A's, the first car completely designed by Ledwinka, were produced in 1900. It had a rearmounted 2714 cc engine and a top speed of 40 km/h (25 mph). It was followed by the Type B (1902), with a central engine. Ledwinka then left to work on steam engine development. Returning in 1905, he designed the Type S, equipped with a 3308 cc four-cylinder engine.

In 1916, Ledwinka left the company for a competitor. In 1919, the company branded its cars Tatra. Two years later, he returned to the company to run its new car plant. It is claimed Ledwinka had the idea of a small "people's car" in 1921. His next design was the Tatra 11 (1923) with a rigid backbone tube, swinging semi-axles at the rear, and a front-mounted, air-cooled two-cylinder engine. The Tatra 17 (1925) had a water-cooled six-cylinder engine and independent suspension; the Tatra 12 (1926) featured four-wheel brakes.


Tatra shifted from luxury cars to streamlined cars, producing the Tatra 77 (1933), the world's first production aerodynamic car. It had a rear-mounted, air-cooled V8 engine. The Tatra 97 (1936) offered a rear-located, rear-wheel drive; air-cooled four-cylinder boxer engine; and luggage storage under the front hood and behind the rear seat. Porsche designed the Volkswagen with similarities to the Tatras, and Tatra sued for patent infringement. However, the lawsuit was halted when Germany invaded Czechoslovakia.



Following the signing of the 1938 Munich Agreement, Czechoslovakia was occupied by the German Reich. Tatra was unavoidably forced into military production, with trucks like Tatra 111 (1942) instrumental in the Nazi war effort and postwar reconstruction.

I find the personal history of Ledwinka, who died in 1967 at the age of 89, fascinating. He considered himself an Austrian rather than a Czech or German and appears to have been preeminently a businessman who dealt

with politicians for the benefit of business.



In 1951, *Die Automobil-Revue* saluted his return to freedom, writing, "After his imprisonment in Czechoslovakia Dr. Ledwinka has not given into the brutal methods of the Communists any more than he had in the past bowed down to the Nazi rulers."

The Tatra company is one of the oldest continuous manufacturers of vehicles. Heavy, off-road Tatra trucks continue to be produced and used in Germany, India, Israel, and the United States. Last made in 1999, Tatra cars are now collector items. Visit the Minneapolis Institute of Art to see the permanent display of a 1948 Tatra T87 sedan, of which only 2,000 were produced. Czech Honorary Consul News

February 2025

Each year, a Czech calendar hangs in the Honorary Consul office. This year's features the Broumov Churches, collectively a National Cultural Monument.

The Broumov region boasts a unique collection of Baroque churches, built between 1709 and 1743, which are masterfully incorporated into the landscape in northeastern Czechia. The calendar was presented to me by Ondřej Pometlo, Deputy Consul General of the Czech Republic/Chicago.





The Minnesota Consular Corps held its annual holiday party at the American Swedish Institute (ASI) in Minneapolis on January 10.

Countries represented in this annual picture on the lovely staircase of the Turnblad Mansion at ASI were Austria, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Croatia, Czech Republic, Ecuador, Finland, France, Germany, Latvia, Lebanon, Netherlands, Norway, Spain, and Sweden.

Again, we were hosted by the Minnesota Trade Office (MTO), headed by Gabrielle Gerbaud, Executive Director and Chief Protocol Officer. Also attending from MTO were Nate Long, Regional Trade Specialist; Barbara Mattson, Regional Trade Manager; and Laurence Reszetar, Director, International Business Strategy.

It's become a tradition for me (left) in early December to go backstage (a.k.a. the Sokol classroom) to watch *Sv. In 2024 I had the honor as Honorary Consul to pass out 34 Czech passports, more than in any previous year. Many were renewals, but some were first time. Included this year was citizenship-by-descent awarded to Dave Stepan, whose grandfather emigrated from Bohemia as a teenager with his family in 1907 to Le Center, Minnesota.

To renew or to apply for a Czech passport, the applicant first must

go to a full diplomatic consulate or the embassy. That person can then request to pick up their new passport at the nearest honorary consul office. Many chose the honorary consul option; there are 24 Czech honorary consul offices in the United States, but only three Czech consulates (New York, Chicago, and Los Angeles) and one Czech embassy in Washington, D.C.
