

Prezidentčin komentář/President's Notes by Bob Kotek


It's Greetings to our Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota community!

January proved to be a very busy and most rewarding month for Sokol Minnesota and for me personally as well. Involvement in the West 7th community through outreach and engagement strengthens our neighborhood as a whole and demonstrates Sokol's ongoing commitment to our neighbors.

Through the years, Sokol volunteers Doreen McKenney and Marit Kucera got to know members of St. Mark Lutheran Church at West 7th and Goodhue through garage sales, Sokol breakfasts, and other events between the two organizations. Through these activities, a mutual respect developed for the goals of each other's groups. Recent circumstances caused St. Mark to disband their congregation. The congregation voted for

Holy Closure which involved selling the building and dispensing all congregational funds. Recipients were 15 organizations, all of which had a close relationship with St. Mark and most of which were located within the neighborhood. Sokol Minnesota received \$28,097, a most generous gift designated for our Legacy Fund. The check was delivered to C.S.P.S Hall on January 6 by (L-R) Nancy Redlin and Mary Miller to Bob Kotek and Marit Kucera.

Origin Story Goes Live on March 14 at C.S.P.S. Hall with Joe Landsberger



Origin Story: Fort Road/West Seventh Street, the Township/City of Saint Paul, the Territory/State of Minnesota; Glacial Age Forward. At the end of 2024, Joe Landsberger published 325 books;

75 were hardcover with marbled end sheets (\$150) and 250 were softcover (\$40). All proceeds, over \$12,00 and counting, benefit C.S.P.S. Hall's Legacy Fund.

Thanks to the enthusiastic demand in the West End and beyond, the editions were nearly sold out within four weeks. The book's 420 pages with 1058 images (85% vintage) are documented with 259 endnotes. Each book was inscribed "Thank you for (contributing to and) supporting the history of immigrants and volunteers of W7!"

The project continues with a series of talks by the author himself, who was Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota president 2006-2010. January 2025 Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota Board Highlights

On January 12, 2025, the Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota Board of Directors' meeting was called to order at 1:20 p.m. by Bob Kotek, our new president, with several board members attending in person at the C.S.P.S. Hall and others attending virtually: Bob Kotek, Fred Simon, Steve Ernest, Silvia Magana, Markéta Pálková, Dave Stepan, Tereza Treanor, Joyce Tesarek, Ed Hamernik, Lucy Rose, Sally Lieberman, and Jean Draheim. The board reviewed and approved the minutes of the November 2024 BOD and the 2024 Annual Membership meetings.

Bob asked board members to describe their committee's goals for 2025. Dave shared that the Building and Property, and Trustee Committee's priorities in the coming year will include replacing windows throughout the Hall as necessary, developing long-range plans for future boiler and elevator replacements, and implementing a floor maintenance

schedule for the main room at the Hall. Markéta discussed plans for improved coordination between the Rental and Finance Committees in 2025, as well as plans for an upcoming dance party event in early April.

Steve's goal for the Membership Committee is to improve communication with our Sokol members to ensure that our organization is meeting their needs and to increase member participation by developing additional benefits of Sokol membership. As chair of the Finance Committee, Joyce echoed Markéta's goal of improved communication between the Finance and Rental Committees. Also Joyce solicited ideas from board members for specific large projects that could be focal points of fundraising efforts over the coming year.

Tereza described the Publicity Committee's plans to increase the visibility of Sokol Minnesota throughout the community by advertising in local publications (such as *My Villager*) and across various social media platforms.

Bob's goals include a planning committee that would set the direction for our organization over the coming year. This would allow us to better allocate awarded grants and donations, such as the \$28,097 gift we received from St. Mark's Lutheran Church following the disbanding of their congregation in 2024.

Several of the committee chairs also submitted their monthly reports to the board.

From the Education Committee, Sally shared that low enrollment for the winter Beginning Slovak class meant that the class would ultimately be canceled. She also said that Joe Landsberger will give a talk about his book on the history of the West Seventh area at the Hall in March.

The Finance Committee report included a summary of cash accounts. Six new members were approved. Motions from the Gaming Committee to approve budgets, expenditures, and funds transfers were also approved.

Preserving and Promoting Cultural Heritage through Puppetry

Nearly ten years ago, UNESCO put Czech and Slovak puppetry on the Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity. Puppets and the elements of the puppet theater in the Czech and Slovak lands probably appeared as long ago as ancient times, primarily in cult rituals, religious ceremonies, and folk customs. Puppetry



has evolved over the years and is still relevant today as evidenced by the number of museums and theater performances dedicated to puppets in these two Central European countries. Puppetry preserved the language and promoted the culture, and that is why it is still relevant today.

During the 19th century when these nations were part of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy, German was the official language of communication and entertainment, especially in the cities. Puppet shows were the only form of theater performed in villages and the only shows performed in the Czech and Slovak languages. Puppeteers were therefore rightly considered heroes of the revival of the Czech and Slovak languages and identity. Puppetry performances in

Czech and Slovak encouraged the use of the Czech and Slovak languages and therefore were instrumental in preserving them.


Two popular puppet characters created by Josef Skupa during the First Republic (1918-1938) were *Spejbl* (created in 1920) and *Hurvinek* (created in 1926). *Spejbl* is the father and *Hurvinek* is the son. Per a story on Radio Prague International (2010), Denisa Kirschnerová, the theater's art and repertory director at that time, described the puppets, "They represent different views of the world. So there is a certain conflict between them, it's the adult man and the small child." Though the comedy is aimed at children, there are many inside jokes that are meant for adults. The topics of the performances evolved with the history of the Czech Republic and Slovakia. The puppets had their own museum,

established in 1930 in Pilsen; it also was the first professional puppet theater established in Czechoslovakia. It was relocated to Prague in 1945. Visit them online at spejbl-hurvinek.cz/ (English version available). Programs are targeted at children aged one to three, children aged four and above, and adults. The puppet theater performances are still relevant and very well attended today.

With funds from the Consulate of the Czech Republic in Chicago, the Czech and Slovak Cultural Center of Minnesota (CSCC) is bringing puppetry to life by including two performances in its 2025 programming in March. The two performances by Marie Černíková (Bio Masha) on March 21 and 22 will be held at the C.S.P.S. Hall in Saint Paul. Co-sponsors are Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota and the Honorary Consulate for the Czech Republic/Minneapolis. The English performance on Friday evening is for adults; the second performance for children on Saturday at noon is bilingual (Czech and English).

CSCC also promoted Czech and Slovak puppetry at the Urban Expedition on February 23 at the Landmark Center, downtown Saint Paul, which featured Czech and Slovak culture through art, dance, music, and food. kstp.com/special-coverage/minnesota-live/urban-expedition/

Czech Honorary Consul News



Carpatho-Rusyns celebrated their Annual Duchnovich Day Celebration on February 1 at the St. Mary's Orthodox Cathedral Parish Center in Northeast Minneapolis. Alexander Vasilyevich Duchnovich (1803-1865), writer, educator, and Greek Catholic priest, is honored today as the Ruthenian national revivalist. This ethnic group has never had

its own country, but live in what today are Slovakia, Ukraine, Hungary, Poland, and Romania. In the late nineteenth century, over 250,000 came to the United States, with some 1,200 settling in Minnesota.

Because so many came from what is now Slovakia, we here in Minnesota consider Carpatho-Rusyns to be part of our greater Czech and Slovak community.



Entertainment was provided by дома/Doma dance theatre, founded by Alexandra Bodnarchuk,



choreographer and performer. Dancing to traditional Rusyn songs, Alexandra continues, as she says, "the ongoing search for the elusive feeling of home" while blazing "a trail for Slavic representation in contemporary dance." The dancers and their shadows portrayed powerful emotions and energy.

My patent (an official document granting a right or privilege) as Honorary Consul of the Czech Republic/Minneapolis has been extended for a third term of five years. I am honored to be the Honorary Consul for Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, and South Dakota. I especially thank Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota for the office space at C.S.P.S. Hall.

Going south for the winter? The Czech Center Museum Houston (4920 San Jacinto Street, Houston, Texas 77004) has *Forgotten Gateway: Coming to America Through Galveston Island* on exhibit from February 6 to April 28. From 1845 to 1924, the Port of Galveston was a major gateway for American immigration. This exhibition is the first of its kind to explore Galveston's legacy as a port of entry on a national scale. It brings to light the little-known, yet rich, era of Galveston's history and its importance to the growth of Texas and the American Midwest. Galveston attracted a diverse group of people from Europe, Mexico, South and Central America, and also Asia. The exhibition highlights enduring themes in the history of immigration including the dangers of the journey, making a life in a new land, navigating bureaucracy, and confronting discrimination. https://www.czechcenter.org/calendar
