For the last six years or so, my primary focus at Sokol Minnesota has been working to maintain our historic C.S.P.S. Hall. With this in mind, I would like to report that in August, two of the last original windows were replaced. The windows are on the Western Avenue (east) side of the building on the ground level of the Pajarito restaurant.

This effort began some four years ago as we talked to a number of firms to find someone who could build the windows to meet the design requirements specified by the Saint Paul Historic Preservation Commission. Once we found the contractor, the next requirement was to fund the project. With the help of Joyce Tesarek, a Neighborhood STAR grant request was written and delivered to the city of St. Paul last year. Joyce and I met in person with the grant administrators to answer questions regarding the project. We are most grateful to report our request was funded at nearly 50% of the project. Next, we informed the contractor we were ready to proceed with the project, and here we are, nearly 10 months later, finally completing it! It was quite a project and quite a process to make this happen. *Nazdar!*

teacher and welcome a new one! Tess Dajc is taking a break after teaching at Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota for more than a decade. Tess's most recent group of students, some of whom have been studying with her for many years, have completed the equivalent of a year of college-level Czech.

Our new Czech teacher for adults, Jana Kalinová Zmrzlíková, will take over where Tess left off with online Intermediate Czech. Jana, who has been teaching Czech as a foreign language for almost 20 years, has experience teaching students in all age groups. She holds a degree in Czech language pedagogy from Masaryk University in Brno. Jana is one of the

July 2025 Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota Board Highlights by Lucy Rose

The July 17, 2025, Board of Directors' meeting was called to order by President Bob Kotek at 7:05 p.m., all participants attended virtually. BOD members: Jean Draheim, Steve Ernest, Ed Hamernik, Don Haselbauer, Sally Lieberman, Markéta Pálková, Bob Kotek, Silvia Magana, Lucy Rose, Fred Simon, Denise Stibal, Joyce Tesarek, Tereza Treanor. Guest: Marit Kucera. The board reviewed and approved the minutes of the June 2025 meeting with minor revisions. The board voted to grant limited access to the digitized Sokol Minnesota historical records to a small group of Czech researchers.

Education Director: Sally Lieberman described the visit to C.S.P.S. Hall by the host of the popular *Cook Like Czechs* website (https://www.cooklikeczechs.com/) on July 25. The event was an informal get-together with Petra Kupská, her son Honza Kupský, her local website subscribers, and interested Sokol Minnesota members.

Sally also updated information on the upcoming fall language classes. Not able to recruit a fourth Czech teacher locally, she is negotiating for a remote language class with a professional instructor for the intermediate level. We currently have local teachers for two levels of Beginning Czech, Advanced Czech, and Beginning Slovak. Registration for all classes should be open by mid-August and classes start the week of September 29.

Building and Property Trustee Committee (BPTC): Bob Kotek updated the status of the upcoming boiler replacement, with discussion

about incorporating the building chimney into the repair plan. New windows are scheduled to be installed on either July 28-29 or August 4-5, and new window shades will be installed as time allows.

Finance Committee: Chair Joyce Tesarek reviewed the account balances for the various bank accounts. The board was also informed about the progress in selecting a new tax accountant; the Finance Committee is following up with a few candidates. The deadline for the Czech government grant is due the end of July; board members discussed several ideas for funding requests to make improvements to the C.S.P.S. Hall and its programs.

Gaming Committee: Chair Ed Hamernik reported on the monthly gaming proceeds and moved to approve the July gaming budget. Motion approved. Ed offered a second motion to approve the total actual expenditure for June 2025. Motion approved. Finally, Ed reviewed the profits and expenditures for June at both the 620 Club and Falling Knife Brewing Company. He moved to approve the statement of operations for June. Motion approved.

Membership Director: Steve Ernest moved to approve the membership of one new member, Sheila Simon, to Sokol Minnesota. Denise Stibal seconded. Motion approved.

Steve raised the idea of organizing a "European Friendship Ride" bicycling event in May 2026 with other Twin Cities European heritage organizations. This event is proposed to be held on Europe Day, May 9, 2026. The board was generally supportive of the idea. Steve plans to contact other European cultural groups to gauge interest.

Rental Committee: Chair Markéta Pálková updated the board on the activities of the Rental Committee, including ongoing revisions to the rental agreement, employee payroll, outside advertising and social media efforts, rental pricing, and protocols for dealing with the stage backdrops during rental events at the C.S.P.S. Hall.

Activities Director and Stage Committee Representative: Jean Draheim reported that the fall postcard is currently out for its second proof reading.

The stage backdrops have all been rerigged so they're easier to handle now. Plans for cleaning the stage backdrops are moving forward on schedule.

Publicity Committee: Chair Tereza Treanor moved to approve a publicity budget item for the Czech & Slovak Festival. Motion approved.

Sunshine Committee and Corresponding Secretary: Denise Stibal reported on her activities during July. She listed the donations from the last month to the General and Legacy funds.

Vice President: Fred Simon reminded the board about the 91st annual Kolacky Days in Montgomery on July 24-26.

Slovo Interim Managing Editor: Marit Kucera stated that the August *Slovo* issue is on schedule for printing the last week of July. The board meeting was adjourned at 8:24 p.m.

Friday, September 19, 7 p.m., C.S.P.S. Hall: In-person presentation by Julie Sedivy: What It Means to Love a Heritage Language. American society holds deeply ambivalent attitudes toward foreign languages. Drawing on her academic research, as well as her own experiences as a heritage speaker of Czech, Julie Sedivy outlines some of the joys and challenges of maintaining a connection to an ancestral language. A Calgary-based writer and language scientist whose work ranges from the scientific to the literary and includes everything in between, Julie Sedivy's textbook on the rapidly growing field of psycholinguistics, Language in Mind, is in its second edition.

October 2, Thursday, 5 p.m. Giesenbräu Bier Company, 1306 First Street NE, New Prague, *Bohemian Serfdom: Myth or Reality?* In-person presentation by Ivo Cerman. Current debates on American slavery have revived the interest in Bohemian serfdom. This peculiar form of bondage existed in Czechlands from the end of the Thirty Years' War (1648)

in Bohemian serfdom. This peculiar form of bondage existed in Czechlands from the end of the Thirty Years' War (1648) until 1781, when it was abolished by Emperor Joseph II. Some current Czech historiography tends to believe that serfdom actually did not exist and that it was only the result of Communist exaggerations. Research by Ivo Cerman shows that serfdom was real and explains how it originated.

Affiliated with the University of South Bohemia in České Budějovice, Dr. Cerman, a Czech historian of the Age of Enlightenment and of Bohemian serfdom, has also worked on aristocratic culture and human rights.

A Bohemian Girl in America by Emily M. K. Polášek. Rollins Press, 120 pages, 1982. Available at libraries.

A Bohemian Girl in America is a charming memoir written by Emily M. K. Polášek about moving from Bohemia and settling in the United States with her parents and five brothers in 1910,

when Emily was thirteen years old. To avoid conscription of their sons, Teresa and Josef Muska left their homeland, comfortable lives, loved ones, and the bakery they owned and ran.

The entire family comes across in the book as extremely likeable, hard-working, friendly, and generous. The descriptions of their escapades in *A Bohemian Girl in America* made a quick and enjoyable read for me.

They bought 40 acres in Phillips, a lumber town in Wisconsin, and marveled at the deer, rabbits, and partridges. Since the land had no house, they rented adjoining land and a log cabin that came with a barn, chicken coop, and a water well.

The ramshackle rented cabin with no furniture was a big disappointment to Mrs. Muska, but Emily and her younger brothers reacted differently. As Emily wrote, "Rudy, Frank, and I awakened the next morning to the blissful sounds of birds singing and the distant tinkling of cow bells. It was a bright, clear, stunning day and the air was wonderfully fresh. The brilliantly colored leaves were dazzling. We were delighted to be surrounded by so much beauty."

Polášek writes captivatingly about the family's adventures, such as three feet of snow falling overnight, celebrating the family's first American Christmas, maple syruping, building a new house, picking wild berries, making wine, watching beavers build their houses, the chimney burning, and the family making music.

After Mr. Muska died four years later, the family moved to live with the older brother Joe in Saint Paul, where they all had opportunities for education. The boys worked in electrical engineering and lighting, founding the Muska Lighting business.

Emily had a long and happy marriage to William Kubat, a dentist she married when she was seventeen. After his death, she married their long-time friend Albin Polášek. Emily Polášek is also the author of *Albin Polášek: Man Carving His Own Destiny* (1970), which has photographs, descriptions, and accounts of many of his sculptures.

Czech Honorary Consul News

September 2025

Czech out New Prague is held annually on the first Thursday evening of August. Organized by the Chamber of Commerce, it features organizations, businesses, churches, the favorite KCHK radio station, schools, scouts, and foundations, plus local eateries, dance performances, and music entertainment, as well as
