

We Need Your Financial Assistance for a New Boiler

This past spring when shutting down the boiler, the Building Property Trustees Committee members noticed steam escaping from locations on the boiler that were not intended for steam to escape. After removing the boiler cover, we experienced what was declared to be the "official" death of the C.S.P.S. Hall boiler. Our boiler needs to be replaced and we need your help to pay for the new heating system.

The boiler we are replacing lasted 25 years, which is considered a short life for a boiler; we had hoped it would have lasted longer. Accordingly, we are working to determine the cause of the boiler's demise. For the new boiler, we have contracted with a mechanical engineer. We have a design and drawings that meets the new building codes. We will use these documents for bids on





the project. We will

have a firm estimate on the cost once the proposals are received. The installation has to be done prior to the heating season of 2025.

We have been working hard this summer and have been diligent in studying alternatives, and this is our best way forward. Please help us financially if you are able. The boiler needs us and we need it. Our preliminary estimated cost is about \$130,000.

We are talking about a plaque on the secondfloor hallway by the elevator with the names of donors over \$500. We specially thank Sokol member Carolyn Sorensen who has already donated \$5,000 toward our new boiler.

Youth Leadership Award Winners by Doreen McKenney

The Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota Youth Leadership Award (YLA) is a way to encourage and recognize outstanding participation of youth members and to foster a future generation of members and leaders for our Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota organization.

Applicants for this award must actively participate in one or more Sokol Minnesota youth activities, such as *Tanečni* Teen dancers, Sokol gymnastics, Czech and Slovak Children's Cultural Day Camp, Sokol Minnesota Youth Link, or actively participate in Czech & Slovak School Twin Cities activities, plus be a regular volunteer at Sokol Minnesotasponsored events.

The 2025 Youth Leadership Award judges were Sokol Minnesota President Bob Kotek, Sokol Minnesota Education Director Sally Lieberman, and Sokol Minnesota member Richard Sargent.

The judges evaluated and scored the YLA award applications. With great pleasure, they announced that Izabela Carlson, Jas Gillman, and Marius Ellis Morse were the winners. Each received a \$500 scholarship from Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota.

Sokol Minnesota furnished \$400 for each award, with M. L. Kucera renewing her annual donation to all three award winners in the amount of \$100 each. Louise Wessinger awarded her annual \$100 prize for the best essay to Marius Ellis Morse.

Special recognition and thanks to Blanka Brichta, who pledged \$300 in 2025 to the YLA fund in support of recognizing Sokol Minnesota's youth and their commitment and involvement with the organization.



Izabela Carlson

Izabela Carlson joined Sokol Minnesota's children's dance group at age four. Izabela is always a joy to have around, naturally helpful, kind to other children, and willing to dance with whomever needed a partner.

Izabela showed leadership skills from the get-go. As a teen dancer she would often demonstrate steps to the other dancers to help them remember the order of the dances. She graciously offered help, especially to new dancers learning the more complicated dance steps, which came as a big help to dance instructor Louise Wessinger. Louise expressed that Izabela always showed up to do her best, be it dance practice or at a performance to represent Sokol Minnesota.

Sokol Minnesota was fortunate to have Izabela's help during the school year at C.S.P.S. Hall on Saturdays, when she assisted with and taught the Slovak language class with her mother, Barbora Carlson. Her Slovak roots are deeply embedded, and during Czech and Slovak family events, Izabela would help the younger children with crafts and lend her musical talent to their music group.



Jas Gillman has been an unwavering part of Sokol Minnesota gymnastics since he was four years old, learning Sokol strength through calisthenics. He started as an enthusiastic participant and has

progressed to a four-time Western District competitor.

This last season, in addition to working out, Jas was coaching classes three days a week at the Hall and helping with setup and takedown of gym equipment. At the 2024 Sokol Instructor School, Jas earned the Bud Benak award, which is given to the individual who truly embodies the spirit of Sokol. Over the last 14 years, Jason Brozovich, Sokol Minnesota's physical director, has had the pleasure of seeing Jas develop into a trustworthy teammate, a competent coach, and a caring, friendly person.

Over the summer, Jas completed his second year at Instructor School, expanding his knowledge in lesson planning and safety for leading classes. He is thankful to be a coach for the Sokol Minnesota gymnastics program and enjoys helping the younger students in the gym. Jas has expressed that he has better communication skills and professionalism that he can use in everyday life because of his experience at Sokol. Being a volunteer at an early age is commendable, and Jas says doing so has taught him to learn more about gymnastics and helping others. He is also very grateful for the leadership mentoring over the years from Mary Cahill and Jason.

Jas is a member of the Sokol Minnesota Youth Link group and has volunteered his time helping with dinners and events at the Hall, Trunks with Treats, the Czech & Slovak Festival, and, this past summer, instructing gymnastics classes at the Sokol Minnesota Children's Cultural Day Camp.

Louise said that Marius has been one of the most fun students, finding joy in life in whatever he does. Through the years, he would always be enthusiastically helpful to the younger children, dance with whomever needed a partner, and assist the new boys learning complicated dances in the teen dancer group.

Marius expressed in his winning essay that participating in Sokol Minnesota helped him become a more thoughtful individual, especially when it came to appreciating the values and traditions of others. Learning countless dances rooted in both Czech and Slovak heritage gave him insight into a culture that emphasizes community, resilience, and joy. He became more aware of how culture shapes identity and how it is important to honor that in himself and others. He firmly believes that he has become more thoughtful and outgoing, and with each new experience he has a chance to explore more cultures, places, and possibilities.



Three young Minnesotans attended Cross-Cultural Pathways for Young Leaders in the Czech Republic hosted by the Mestenhauser Institute for International Collaboration (MIIC), with scholarship support from Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota and the Czech and Slovak Cultural Center of Minnesota.

The trip took place July 14-23 and included visits to Prague, Hradec Králové, Ostrava, and Brno. Four college students and two high school students from the United States participated. Our Minnesota scholars presented their research on August 9 at C.S.P.S. Hall. MIIC is named for Josef Mestenhauser (1925-2015), a distinguished **International Professor** at the University of Minnesota, pioneer in the field of international education, and former Honorary Consul to the Czech Republic/ Minneapolis (1998-2008).

Brand New International Festival of Minnesota coming to Saint Paul, April 10-11, 2026 By Doreen McKenney

Ethnic groups and organizations were invited to attend an informal happy hour at Dual Citizen Brewing Company, Saint Paul, on August 27, to reconnect with Festival of Nations (FON) friends and to learn about the new International Festival of Minnesota (IF). The new event is planned for April 10-11, 2026, at the

Roy Wilkins Auditorium, downtown Saint Paul. Sokol Minnesota members Louise Wessinger represented the teen dance group, Doreen McKenney attended on behalf of the bazaar and the exhibit booths, and Joyce Tesarek represented the food booth.

Following the passage of the Clean Water, Land, and Legacy Amendment in 2008, the Minnesota Legislature changed the state law to allow cultural organizations to apply for an

array of operating grants. A unique grant in 2024 for \$20,00 was awarded to the Saint Paul Festival Association to revive the annual Festival of Nations. Started in 1932, the Festival of Nations lapsed during the pandemic and then ended for good in 2023.

Louise Wessinger proudly proclaimed that "Sokol has

represented the Czech and Slovak (then Czechoslovak) groups since the very first FON in 1932. We are one of only eight nationalities that have been represented in every FON since it started, which is quite an honor."

Sokol Minnesota's Kroje Closet By Louise Wessinger and Doreen McKenney

Louise Wessinger has been the keeper of Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota's folk costumes (*kroje*) for the past 40 years. The "*kroje* closet" at the Hall holds approximately 200 full *kroje*, plus 15 special complete *kroje*, which are not used for dancing, but kept for special events such as *kroje* style shows and anniversary events. Also, there are many women's skirts and vests and men's shirts and vests for special events, which volunteers and children's and teens dance groups can rent and use during large festivals, such as the former Festival of Nations (1932 - 2023). Throughout the year as kids outgrow their *kroje*, they can exchange sizes because of the inventory that Sokol Minnesota maintains. Louise has mended countless pieces, ironed them, and even dropped off pieces at the dry cleaners, so the kids in the dance program can always look great for a performance. In addition to the "*kroje* closet" at the hall, Louise stored over five clothes racks full of *kroje* at her home.

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
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Over the years a variety of pieces donated were not complete or needed repair like buttons missing, petrified elastic, machine or hand-made bobbin lace became ragged, and under skirts or aprons needed alterations. Louise lovingly made repairs, and she continues to this day to repair *kroje*.

Over the summer Doreen McKenney helped Louise repair several pieces. Doreen made an interesting, but not entirely surprising discovery recently, when she removed the tattered fabric on a vest. Newspaper! Newspaper was sometimes used to stiffen *kroj* pieces. It was also used, and still sometimes is, to puff-up tops of sleeves or stiffen skirt hems.

As a scholarship holder of the Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports of the Czech Republic, he attended the 68th edition of the Summer School of Slavonic Studies, which took place from July 17 to August 14, 2025.

Congratulations also to Sokol Member Mike Topic, who attended the Poděbrady Czech Language School, July 14-August 8, 2025, in the Czech Republic, on a scholarship awarded through the Consulate of the Czech Republic/Chicago. It is a program of the Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports of the Czech Republic. This four-week course of the Czech language is intended for those over 18 years of age, who would like to learn their immigrant forebear's language or improve their existing Czech language skills. The course gives them the opportunity to familiarize themselves with the Czech culture and get to know different parts of Czechia. A diverse extracurricular program (forums, excursions, lectures, weekend day trips, and more) is prepared for course participants. Tuition, board, and lodging are provided to select participants who win scholarships. Others can attend and pay their own expenses. Application forms can be submitted online to the Embassy of the Czech Republic in Washington, D.C., or one of the three Czech Consulates (New York, Chicago, Los Angeles). Upper Midwest, including Minnesota, applicants apply through Chicago. March 15 is the deadline for 2026. Look for an article in the November 2025 Slovo by Mike about his experiences at the Poděbrady Czech Language School.

Creek Backyard Ultra in Maple Grove, Minnesota. She conquered the full 100 miles, finishing 13th overall out of 153 participants. Her time: 21.02.01.

She placed ninth among female finishers in the 50-mile race (time: 13:21:43) in the Black Hills 100 in Sturgis, South Dakota, in late June. Her next race is Duff Dog Backyard Ultra at Blue Mounds State Park near Luverne, Minnesota, on October 11.

Affectionately known as "Miss Katka" to the young folk dancers at Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota, she has assisted "Miss Louise," Louise Wessinger, the director of the children's dance group *Taneční Mládež*. Katka also performs with the *Lipa* Carpatho-Rusyn Slovak Dancers.

As the proud mother of two daughters, she actively encourages them to stay connected to their Czech-Slovak heritage through Sokol folk dancing, gymnastics, and cultural festivals. Community Reporter, September 2025, page 2: Notebook Recollections by Tim Rumsey, Rest in Peace. Mr. Positive, "Sunday August 3, 2025, 5:45 p.m. West 7th's C.S.P.P. Hall was emptied out. Lights down, chairs and tables folded and put away. ... The beautiful 140year-old wood floor was being swept, polished. ... This was Carl's party. The Mr. Positive memorial.C.S.P.S. program manager Dawn had arranged and watched over a magnificent celebration. ... We won't be seeing Carl and his trusty three-wheeler all over West 7th anymore.' The Glass Room by Simon Mawer. Other Press: New York, 405 pages, 2009. Available at libraries and bookstores.

The main character in *The Glass Room* (*Glasraum* in German) is a magnificent Bauhaus-style building in

Bohemia. Mawer has set an imagined story in a house, which is based on the real Villa Tugendhat designed by architect Mies van der Rohe in Brno in the 1920s.

The glass room of the fictional hilltop Landauer house is a masterpiece of steel, travertine floors, an onyx wall that changes color as the sun sets, and windows looking out on a garden.

The story opens with honeymooners Viktor and Liesel Landauer, a Jew married to a gentile, meeting architect Rainer Von Abt, who builds for them this highly modern home. It signifies their optimism and faith in the future, the spirit of the post-World War I world where they believe reason and democracy will prevail.

The couple start a family with daughter Ottilie and son Martin and enjoy the house for ten years. Then the darkness leading to World War II harms Viktor's successful automobile business and makes him realize the Nazi threat. The family flees to Switzerland and eventually to the United States.

The storyline of *The Glass Room* covers six decades as the building passes from private ownership to different uses under Nazi and communist control, and finally as a museum.

Although Mawer can tell a good story and his prose can be smooth and lyrical, two flaws in the book are irritating to

me. Almost all characters are sexualized and depicted in numerous tedious and repetitive sex scenes. Considering European history's importance to the storyline, the book would be better if the author included dates instead of referring to seasons, et cetera.


The book was short-listed for the Man Booker Prize and named best book of the year in 2009 by six publications. *The Glass Room* is one of 14 books by award-winning Mawer, who was born and educated in England and worked as a biology teacher. He lived in Rome with his family from 1977 until his death in February 2025 at the age of 76.

In an interview (March 18, 2012, iDNES.cz), the daughter of the owner of the real Villa Tugendhat was asked what she thought of the book. Mawer, who had not contacted her family, depicted the fictional father repeatedly visiting a prostitute. She replied to the interviewer, "For me, it's another theft. First the Nazis took our house, and now Mawer has taken our story.

The novel is not about our family, it's against our family. It makes me furious."

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


Czech **Honorary** Consul News

October 2025

A delegation from Pardubice Region of the Czech Republic visited the Twin Cities on August 22, between several days of community events with Czech-American descendants in Rice Lake, Wisconsin, which is sister city to Zamberk in the Pardubice Region. Their focus in coming to Saint Paul was to meet with local leaders to learn about municipal and regional public/private partnerships for business incubators and how startups and early-stage entrepreneurs are supported.

Timber! Art and Woodwork at the Fall of the Austro-Hungarian Empire is on exhibit at the Minneapolis Institute of Art (Mia) until January 4, 2026, in the Cargill Gallery. Of special interest are the works by Moravian-born Josef Hoffman (1870-1956). This 1904 table is ebonized oak with white filler, boxwood inlay, silver-plated mounts. Waterfall (Wasserfall), printed black on white cotton (1910-1912), hangs on the wall to the right of the table.

Also in the exhibit is a Sitzmachine reclining chair, designed in 1905 by Hoffman for the Purkersdorf Sanatorium, outside Vienna. This sanitorium was more of a hotel than a hospital and turned into a social and artistic venue for Viennese society. Among the treatments were mineral baths, physical therapies, therapeutic massages, and physiotherapy, typical of traditional Czech and Slovak spa towns. The chair became known as the Sitzmachine with its adjustable recline when furniture maker Kohn began to show it at international Design exhibitions around Europe.

Other examples of Hoffman's work included in this exhibit are a silver-plated metal storm lantern (1904) and a basket with nickel-plated brass (1905-1910), plus the work by well-known Austrian expressionist artist, Egon Schiele (1890-1918) and others from early 20th-century Austria-Hungary.
