Nearly every month had a celebration of some sort, be it a dinner prepared by our talented volunteer kitchen crew, Urban Expedition at the Landmark Center to showcase our Czech and Slovak cultures, or *The Accidental Hero* performance by Patrick Dewane. There were many language classes, gymnastics classes, Saturday morning youth language (*škola*) classes, along with youth folk dance too! The 28th Children's Czech and Slovak Cultural Day Camp was held in June, as well as other youth group activities. Three youth leaders won monetary awards for their commitment to volunteering at Sokol Minnesota, plus two college-aged students were awarded tuition scholarships for a summer trip to the Czech Republic to explore Czech culture and tour Czechia.

Who can forget Sokol's C&S Festival in September? What a great turnout of membership and the community to experience our Czech and Slovak cultures and cuisine! I think it is safe to say Sokol broke the record for attendance and revenue generated as a result.

Improvements to the C.S.P.S. Hall are an ongoing effort. Seven new windows were installed on the first and second floors, and a door was added to provide safer access to the roof and HVAC equipment. Work has begun on the cleaning and refurbishing of the precious historic art work backdrops on the stage. The primary boiler unit that heats the hall is in the process of being replaced. To put all this in perspective, these three initiatives represent \$200,000 in capital investments!



Sokol President Bob Kotek accepted Ed Hamernik's donation check, designated for boiler replacement, on November 4, during a meeting of the Gaming Committee to count pull tabs from our two gaming sites, the 620 Club and Bad Weather Brewing.

All this being said, I must share my thanks and gratitude for all the financial support by Sokol members and non-members that made all this possible! Grants from the City of Saint Paul, the J.A. Wedum Foundation, and the American Sokol Foundation, a donation from the former St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran church, Patrick Dewane's performance donation, and Joe Landsberger's donation of book sales proceeds, and the very generous gift to the boiler fund from Sokol members Ed and (the late) Arlene Hamernik and family in early November, have all gone a long way to keeping Sokol Minnesota a viable resource for all of us to enjoy.

I want to add that Sokol volunteers are the cornerstone of who we are and what we do! The untold hours by the many talented individuals truly make a huge difference in our ability to provide the many varied programs for everyone to enjoy.

There is always more to do, more to accomplish and more things to support. With all of us working together, we can move mountains and have the best Sokol experience for everyone. Thank you! *Nazdar!*

Czech Glass and Beadmaking Lecture and Class on February 1 by Sally Lieberman, Education Director

On February 1, 1-2:30 p.m., Andrea Turini, Minnesota jewelry artist, presents *Heirloom Fire: Czech Glasswork* for an inside look at the rich history and living traditions of Czech glass and beadmaking. Based on her travels to Jablonec nad Nisou, the heart of the Czech glass industry, Andrea shares original photos and video from local workshops and factories, exploring how a small cottage industry evolved through communism and globalization, while continuing to shape modern design today. The presentation includes a hands-on demonstration of bead and button production and examples of

finished Czech glass jewelry. C.S.P.S. Hall, Second Floor. Cost to attend is \$5 Sokol members* or \$10 non-members* (*Free with registration for the Jewelry Design Class).



Following her *Heirloom Fire: Czech Glasswork* presentation. Andrea leads a hands-on *Czech Jewelry Design Class* where participants can create their own Czech glass jewelry.

You can choose to make an earring and necklace set or an earring and bracelet set using authentic Czech beads from Andrea's collection. Participants will select their beads and design their pieces; Andrea will complete the technical finishing during class. All skill levels are welcome. Class participants are expected to have attended the *Heritage Fire* presentation first. Sunday, February 1, 3-4 p.m. C.S.P.S. Hall, Second Floor. Class is limited to 12 participants, ages 16+. Cost is \$35 Sokol members or \$45 non-members (includes the presentation).

Like all of you, we look forward to this year's caroling and festivities. Veselé vánoce a šťastný nový rok! Veselé vianoce a šťastný nový rok!





In Memory: Lloyd Krocak



Lloyd Krocak, age 92, of Prior Lake, formerly of Montgomery, died November 11. He was born June 17, 1933, on the family farm in Lanesburgh Township, Le Sueur County, in the heart of Czech Country Minnesota. He graduated from Montgomery High School and went on to complete his degree in Mechanical Engineering at the University of Minnesota.

Lloyd was particularly proud of three things in his life. His family topped that list, then antique tractors, and his Czech heritage followed closely behind. He was active at our St. Paul Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota for 22 years, serving on the Property Trustees Committee where his skills as a mechanical engineer volunteer since 2010 were greatly appreciated. News from Slovak Section of Česká a slovenská škola Twin Cities/ Czech and Slovak School Twin Cities by Barbora Carlson

Language classes for children in our Česká a slovenská škola Twin Cities are again in full swing for 2025-2026, but at the Czech & Slovak Festival this September, we took time to recognize the achievements of our students from the past school year.

Vivien Makoviny and Maja Batalden, two high school students, were awarded *Minnesota Seals of Biliteracy* in the Slovak language for their performance in speaking, listening, reading, and writing. Congratulations! Both girls grew up in Slovak-speaking families. Vivien also attended Saturday language classes at

skola leading up to her test in the spring of 2025. She is now a freshman at the University of Minnesota studying kinesiology, on track to be a radiation therapist. Maja is now a senior at Southwest High School in Minneapolis,

Our older students also participated in a literary contest, Prečo mám rád slovenčinu, prečo mám rád Slovensko/Why I Love the Slovak Language, Why I Love Slovakia. Every year students from all over Slovakia submit essays and literary pieces to this contest. IVAN KLÍMA

My First Loves by Ivan Klima, translated by Ewald Osers. W.W. Norton & Company: New York and London, 168 pages, 1986, published in Czech in 1985 and earlier in samizdat. Available at bookstores and libraries.

Writer, teacher, and dissident Ivan Klima died on October 4 at the age of 94. He was born Ivan Kauders in Prague on

September 9, 1931. His family changed their last name to one less German-sounding after World War II. Klima was not aware of his Jewish heritage until after the German invasion of Czechoslovakia in 1938. He was incarcerated in the Terezin concentration camp from 1941 to 1945 and lived with the possibility of being transported to Auschwitz at any time. Some of his best work, including *Judge on Trial*, reflected on those horrors. In 1986, *My First Loves* was Klima's first book published in the United States. At the time, he was enduring a two-decade "period of silence," blacklisted by the Communist Party

in Czechoslovakia and forced to take menial

jobs until 1989. Unlike some Czech authors who left their country or were pushed out after the suppression of the Prague Spring, Klima had returned to Prague in 1970 from a sabbatical at the University of Michigan. He then found himself prevented from publishing in the state-run printing houses and official media.

Klima wrote more than 40 books. He received the Franz Kafka Award in 2002 and the Magnesia Litera, a Czech literary prize, in 2010 for his memoir, *My Crazy Century*. The author looked back on his youth in *My First Loves*, a collection of four stories he wrote in middle age. They were first issued in Prague in the 1980s in *samizdat*, the

underground literary network that circulated typescript copies of banned authors' works to readers in the Eastern Bloc.

In the story "Miriam," the protagonist is among nine people cramped into his aunt's little room. They managed to celebrate a relative's engagement despite being in ghetto lodging infected with bed bugs and fleas, as they waited for

deportation orders to Terezin. Miriam, the girl who ladles out the milk ration, starts smiling at him and giving him larger portions. Very young and shy, he imagines what he'd say to her, but doesn't work up the courage until it is too late. I found this story, the shortest, to be the most moving.

In another story, "My Country," the war is over and the young man and his family are on vacation. He becomes infatuated with a doctor's pretty wife. He accompanies her to an opera, and when she speaks to him, "she smiled at me in such a way that I immediately if only for a moment, soared upwards and out of the hall. I was flying with her like a bird, like a balloon,

across the wide sky, and our arms entwined and our lips touched." I found Klima's writing throughout the book to be gentle, sensual, and charming.


